#### NO NEW CASES IN THREE WEEKS.

##### Alarmist Reports of Smallpox in Galt Not Warranted.

In an interview with Dr. J. S. Wardlaw, Medical Officer of Galt, with reference to the outbreak of smallpox, that officer states that there is not the slightest cause for the alarmist reports that have been circulated. There are no cases in Galt; the Isolation Hospital, in charge of Dr. King, of the Provincial Board of Health, is treating 12 cases, and the houses from which these cases came are being doubly guarded by sanitary police. There has been no new case for three weeks, and all the cases since the first outbreak have come from the houses now isolated, which goes to prove the effectiveness of the active measures now taken by the Galt authorities.

Some annoyance has been caused by exaggerated reports. The Paris Hockey Club was to have met Galt a few days ago, but the match has been deferred, simply in deference to individual opinion, and not, as the result of any official command.

The members of the Galt Curling Club were informed that if they came to Guelph to meet the Scottish curlers, as arranged, the rink would be closed. This action was arbitrary on the part of Guelph, and without any suggestion from Galt authorities.

It is said that some of the commercial travelers have been kept out of Galt by the railroad booking clerks at other points, who stated that they might enter Galt, but would probably be held there in quarantine.

An inquiry at the Grand Trunk offices proved this to be erroneous, as no orders have been issued respecting the trains calling at Galt.

The epidemic is now under complete control, and the schools, which have been closed, merely as a precautionary measure, will be reopened on Monday.

#### TOTAL LOSS OF LIFE IS 23

##### Counting the Cost of the Appalling Railway Disaster at Graceland, N.J.

##### BLAME PLACED ON THE ENGINEER.

##### Expected Lights to Change and When They Did Not It Was Too Late to Stop.

New York, Jan. 28.—Up to noon today the total loss of life by last night's train wreck on the Central Railroad of New Jersey at Graceland, N. J., was believed to be 23. Thirteen bodies had been identified, and 10 were held at Plainfield for identification. From the wreckage 21 bodies were taken, and two men—W. E. Davis, engineer of the Philadelphia and Reading Express, and Thomas McCarthy, fireman of the same train—died in a hospital today.

More than 50 persons were injured, some of them very severely. The hospital reports to-day, however, were that, with one or two exceptions, all will recover. The blame for the dreadful occurrence is placed by the officials of the Jersey Central on W. E. Davis, engineer of the Philadelphia and Reading Express, and according to a policeman who took Davis from the wrecked engine, Davis admitted that he had taken chances, disregarding the danger signals displayed, expecting to see the red and green lights change to white, as he neared them. They did not change. It was too late to stop, and, in addition, the crash came, carrying death to more than a score of human beings. The scenes following the wreck were unusually horrible, because the cars were piled almost to killing wood by the force of the collision, hotcoals from the engine poured out from every crack, and the wood was soon burning fiercely. An eastbound train then ran into the wreckage, and killed two, and added to the loss of life.

Most of the passengers on the local express, on which all the day of the wreck were riding, were well-to-do residents of Plainfield and vicinity, returning home from their places of business in New York. New every block in Plainfield seemed to have one or more of the wounded in it to-day, but the facilities for caring for them were ample.

The Jersey Central tracks had been cleared before daylight and the only signs left to-day were the black patches on the snow where the wreck burned.

#### MUST PRODUCE PAPERS.

##### Certiorari Granted in Referendum Personation Case.

Alexander Mills acting for the prohibitionists, yesterday applied for, and was granted, a writ of certiorari to compel the Police Magistrate to produce the papers in the case of Adam S. Case, fined in the Police Court for impersonation on the day of the referendum voting. The application was made to Mr. Justice Scott, at Osgoode. It has been decided to make case a test case, and the writ is granted. Others who will be proceeded against are James Haveron and T. C. Robinson, who were charged with impersonating the defendant in the referendum case. The papers produced, and ordered the papers produced. The application for a mandamus was adjourned until the papers are brought up.

#### SMUGGLED FROM CANADA AND LOST IN PITTSBURGH, Pa.

Pittsburgh, Jan. 28.—Eleven Chinese, smuggled across the Canadian border, are thought to be hiding in Pittsburgh. Information to this effect reached the Federal officials here from Deputy Marshal James Manley of the Northern New York District. His telegram was delayed until late hour. The party arrived at 6:45 o'clock, and vanished.

#### Verdict This Morning.

The jury in the case of Hugh Flett against Crozier Coulter, which occupied the attention of the Civil Justice Court yesterday, will announce their verdict when court opens this morning. The suit arose out of the death of a young son of Flett's, who was killed in the face by a horse belonging to the defendant, which was pasturing in a vacant lot at the time. The defence is provocation on the part of the boy, and the fact that he was trespassing on private property. The father sues for \$3,000, on the ground that the boy was disgraced by the accident, and permanently incapacitated for work.

#### St. Joseph Court Officers.

McEntee; Board of Trustees, John Broderick, financial secretary, Mr. W. J. Mitchell, and two of the trustees were unavoidably absent through illness.

#### Another Prohibition Petition.

According to the president of the Toronto W. T. U., J. B. Stevens, a petition, representative of every portion of the Dominion, will be presented at Ottawa shortly after the opening of the Dominion House. The petition will call for the prohibition of manufacture, importation and sale of liquor.

#### To Go to New York.

Hon. Richard Harcourt and President London of the university go to New York at the end of this week to attend a meeting of an Alumni Association, which is in course of formation. The movement is of comparatively recent date, but has spread rapidly.

#### Indians Take a Town.

Cananea, Mexico, Jan. 28.—The Yaquis have attacked the town of San Marcial, the mining centre of the State, and almost taken possession of it. The defenders of the city included more than 20 Americans, 8 of whom were killed.

#### Boiler Kills Six.

Anniston, Ala., Jan. 28.—A large boiler, in the malleable foundry of the Southern Car and Foundry Company exploded today. Six persons were killed, and probably 20 were injured.

#### Boiler Kills One.

Evans City, Pa., Jan. 28.—A boiler explosion in the machine shop of the South Penn Oil Company today wrecked the building. Elmer Reichner was killed. Two men were seriously injured.

It will be remembered that the Capital Stock of the Company was subscribed at a premium of 25, making a total cash payment of \$1,250,000, so that during its four years of business existence the Company has, in addition to paying its dividends, increased its Reserve by \$50,000 and earned the further sum of \$12,443.18 now appearing at the credit of Profit and Loss Account. At their actual market value the securities mentioned in the Statement of Assets show substantial surplus over the figures at which they stand on the books of the Company.

The general business of the Company at Toronto, Montreal and Winnipeg has been highly satisfactory.
