CANADIANS BANQUETING

Interesting Gathering in the British Metropolis.

Lord Aberdeen Chief Guest of the Evening.

Canada's Progressive and Loyal Spirit Emphasized.

The Sad Death of Prince Alfred—The Irish Leadership Discussed—Duke of Teck in a Serious Condition—Dreyfus to Come Back to Paris.

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Among the other members of the thoroughly representative company were Lieut.-Gen. John Wilmour Laurie, Conservative member of parliament for Holbrooke Borough, long identified with the interests of the Dominion; Mr. Edward Blake, Nationalist member for South Longford, and Mr. J. G. Colmer, secretary to the office of high commissioner for Canada. There was the greatest enthusiasm when the health of her majesty was proposed, Lord Aberdeen leading in singing "God Save the Queen."

Lieut.-Gen. Laurie, in replying to the toast to the army, said that the better relations between the United States and Canada relieved the latter of the necessity of defending the long southern frontier.

Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, proposing "The Dominion of Canada," expressed his great satisfaction that the relations between Great Britain and the United States had of late been so much improved. He hoped that the joint high commission would be able to remove the last traces of friction and draw the Anglo-Saxons still closer together.

The Earl of Aberdeen, who replied, dwelt upon Canada's gift in the matter of tariff and penny postage and upon her unceasing loyal support of the Empire.

IN CUBA

Yellow Fever Breaks Out Among the U. S. Troops.

Gomez in Bad Odor With the Cuban Assembly Executive Committee.

Guanajay, Province of Pinar Del Rio, Cuba, Feb. 8.—Six cases of yellow fever have been developed among the soldiers belonging to the Two Hundred and Second New York Regiment. Private Cloney is very sick, but the other cases are not regarded as being especially serious. The regimental camp will move from its present location as soon as the weather permits. Dr. Echeverria, the yellow fever expert, sent here by Lieut. O'Reilly, chief surgeon of the department of Cuba, says there is no doubt the soldiers are suffering from yellow fever, but he adds that there is no likelihood of its spread, as every precaution for the isolation and quarantine has been taken.

GOMEZ IN BAD ODOR. Havana, Feb. 9.—It is reported that the executive committee of the Cuban Assembly will not welcome General Maximiliano Gomez to this city and that if General Gomez does not go before the committee and explains his reasons for accepting the propositions of Mr. Robert P. Porter, the representative of President McKinley, without consulting the committee, he will be officially notified upon the part of the committee, to appear before it and explain his conduct.

The Havana correspondent of the London Times says that General Maximiliano Gomez has agreed to refer to the Cuban Assembly at Matanzas, the American offer of \$3,000,000 to pay off the Cuban army on condition of disbandment.

LOSS \$400,000

By the Burning of the Big Hotel and Depot at Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 9.—The loss by the burning of the Manitoba Hotel and the Northern Pacific offices Tuesday, Feb. 8, was \$400,000. The Manitoba Hotel, stories high, was the finest Canadian hotel west of Montreal. It was built in 1891 by the Northern Pacific and cost \$300,000, with the contents the total loss will be \$400,000. The company carried its own insurance. The loss is a heavy blow to the city. The fire brigade worked heroically under the disadvantage of a bitter north breeze and the mercury 45 below. There were several narrow escapes, but no casualties.

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GOOD PLACE TO COME TO.

Lord Strathcona's letter to the press regarding Canadian opening for emigrants and capitalists has brought a remarkable number of responses to the high commissioner's office, Westminster. The Canadian Gazette emphasizes Lord Strathcona's promise that emigrants will be cordially welcomed, not by an alien race, but by their kith and kin. Canada is clearly a theme of great interest to large numbers of Englishmen.

Lord Mount Stephen has sent £1,000 to the Prince of Wales' hospital fund, and says he intends to contribute a like sum annually.

The latest Klondike flotation is the Bennett Lake and Klondike Navigation Company, with a capital of £100,000. Mr. Lowles, M.P., is chairman. The flotation excites some adverse comment. The Westminster Gazette says the new shares will be left to the gamblers, who have underwritten them up. The terms the directors go not find convenient to disclose, making up of the obnoxious waive clause to hide the contracts from those whose money they seek.

IMPORTS FROM CANADA.

The trade returns for January show the following results: Imports from Canada, increases, sheep, £3,450; corn, £19,000; bacon, £7,000; hams, £17,000; butter, £2,000; eggs, £500; timber, £11,000; decrease, cattle, £3,000; fish, £15,000; peas, £10,000; cheese, £28,000; £23,000.

PRINCE ALBERT'S SAD DEATH.

The London Morning Leader publishes the following dispatch from Meran, in the Austrian Tyrol: "Nothing could be sadder than the circumstances attending the death of Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg on Monday, in this lonely spot, left alone by his friends and surrounded by strange faces. There is a certain mystery enveloping the whole affair. When he arrived a fortnight ago the young prince was already debilitated and dying. Yet he was accompanied by a single doctor. He was so weak that he could not stand. At times he was unable even to convey his food to his mouth. He raved in his delirium of his childhood, relatives and comrades, and had frequent fits, during which he suffered agony, and would cry like a child, begging his father and mother, in heartrending terms, to save him from the awful pains in his head. Toward the end his pains increased, causing frightful scenes. He died in a delirium, alone with the two doctors entrusted with the case. It seems strange that no relatives or friends were summoned to the deathbed. The proprietor of the sanitarium declined to state the cause of death, and the registrar at the town hall, where the death certificate was under lock and key, and will be shown to nobody."

DILLON'S SUCCESSOR.

Thomas Sexton declines to undertake the leadership of the Irish party in the House of Commons, and it is probable that Mr. Dillon's successor will be Sir Thomas Henry Esmonde, Anti-Parnellite, member for West Kerry, and senior whip of the party.

The Times discusses the rumored probability of Hon. Edward Blake being chosen to the position, and says that judging by Mr. Blake's career in Canada, it is not at all likely that he would be selected to hold together a party in danger of breaking up.

THE DUKE OF TECK'S CONDITION.

The Duke of Teck's condition from ossification of the brain is causing great pain and anxiety to his family and royal relations. His mental state is now hopeless. Day and night two nurses watch him. He has occasional brief lucid intervals, when he realizes his condition, and suffers the keenest mental anguish, giving rise to scenes most trying to himself and those about him. The Duchess of York visits him

at White Lodge regularly, and is deeply distressed at her father's condition.

BRAVERY RECOGNIZED.

The committee of Lloyd's has bestowed silver medals on Capt. Watkins, of the steamer Paris; Mr. John Bradshaw, first officer, and Mr. R. H. Webb, fourth officer, and has awarded bronze medals to the eight sailors of the Paris for saving the crew, consisting of 22 men, of the British steamship Vindolala on Dec. 27 last in mid-Atlantic.

DISTRESS IN RUSSIA.

The attention of the Russian Government is largely given to the famine which prevails in some of the provinces. This is not a famine as we understand the word, but might be illustrated by saying that if there was plenty of grain in Ohio, and none in Missouri, and the means of communication were very poor, or almost impossible, we would have to deal with a situation similar to that which now confronts the Russian Government.

CABLE NOTES.

The Queen-Regent of Spain has signed the decree convoking the cortes on Feb. 20, and re-establishing the constitutional guarantees.
