PUT ME OFF AT OTTAWA

One-Third of the City Council
Named on a Deputation

To Wait on the Government in the Interests of the Proposed L. & L. H. Electric Railway—Taking Possession of the Contagious Ravillon.

Impressive harmony prevailed at the special meeting of the council last night. It was the sweetest, briefest meeting on record. With one voice the aldermen hummed that grand old incantation, "Put me off at Ottawa," and in 15 minutes six passes were issued. There was magic in it. Such a peaceful gathering of the city fathers heretofore seemed impossible. But last night it was as though the party had already set out on their agreeable junketing at the city's expense. The mayor presided. Ald. Greenleaf, Malloch, McCallum, O'Meara, Plant, Kumball, and Winnett were absent.

The following letter addressed to the mayor was received from Mr. M. Cameron, solicitor for the London, Lucan and Lake Huron Railway:

"I have been requested by those interested in the building of the London, Lucan and Lake Huron Railway to ask you to appoint a small deputation from your council to visit Ottawa along with other gentlemen from the locality interested, to interview the government and endeavor to obtain a bonus to assist in building the road at an early date. The line proposed runs north from London to Lucan, Exeter, and thence to Lake Huron. The building and completion of such a railway would be of immense value to your city, and I feel sure you will assist us in the way asked by sending a deputation to Ottawa at a date to be arranged later, when the government can receive us, I will advise the day as soon as I can get an appointment."

Ald. Carrothers moved and Ald. McPhillips seconded that the prayer of the petition be granted. Carried.

Ald. Carrothers moved, and Ald. McPhillips seconded that Ald. Pritchard, Douglass, Carrothers, Garratt, Dreaney and Greenleaf be a deputation for the purpose requested.

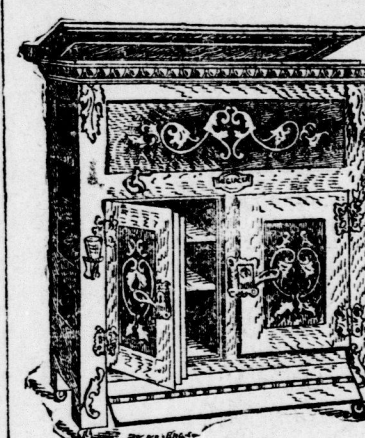
