I want Canada and her sister nations to remain self-governing states, loyal to the British crown. "In case of emergency," he coninued, "Canada could fight for the

defense which would place soldiers at the disposal of the King except in the Canada's ideal was peace. She must

never be drawn into the vortex of European militiaism. Europe was an armed peace. There everyone was constantly looking for war. "On this continent," he declared, "no

standing armies are unknown." Sir Wilfrid referred to the recent treaty made with France. "Canada," said Sir Wilfrid, "should make her own treaties. She could make a better bargain for herself than Great

Britain could make for her. I know of no case where Great Britain had undertaken to act for Canada in negotiating with a foreign nation, but that Canada got the worst of it."
