If fish are dipped into hot water for a minute they will scale much easier. As soon as fish are cleaned, wash once or twice, and sprimkle salt around it well before placing in a cool spot. The salt helps to check the outflow of juices.

Fish is highly nitrogenous and requires an abundant use of starchy food in combination with it to give a sufficient amount of heat-giving material. In baking fish, dredge it well with flour before placing in the bake-pan, and taste often. This prevents the skin cracking.



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




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
