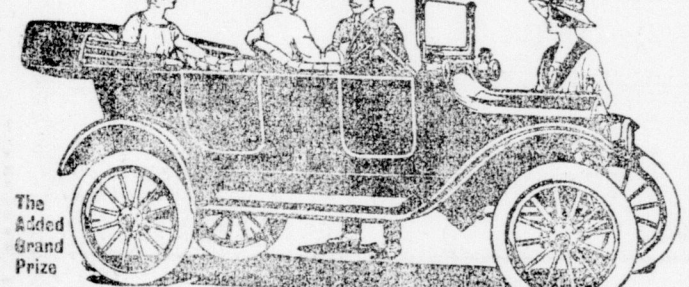

SALADS

Banana Salad.—Take one-half cup of walnut meats, chop, and dry on brown paper near heat. Peel and slice bananas, dressing ready; peel bananas and cut in two crosswise; lay lettuce or other greens on salad, and mix with dressing, then in chopped nuts, lay on dressing, and put candied cherries (or preserved cherries squeezed free of juice) one at a time in a row on top of bananas.

Potato Salad.—Six medium-sized potatoes boiled and diced, one tablespoonful of onion juice, one large fresh cucumber diced, one tablespoonful of salt, one-half teaspoonful of pepper, six tablespoonfuls melted butter and four tablespoonfuls vinegar. Stand in refrigerator until ready to serve, then mixed with enough cooked dressing to make palatable. Garnish and serve. In winter, use cup chopped walnuts or one cup celery, chopped fine, may be substituted for the cucumber. This may be garnished with hard-boiled eggs.

Dressing.—One-quarter tablespoonful salt, 1/2 teaspoonful sugar, 1/2 tablespoonful four, 2 eggs (yolks only), 1/2 tablespoonful melted butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup vinegar. Mix dry ingredients and yolks of eggs slightly beaten, then mix with vinegar very slowly. Cook over boiling water until mixture thickens. Thin this mixture with cream and vinegar and pour over layers of cold boiled potatoes, sliced with a little raw onion and hard-boiled eggs. Half of quantity makes enough for a nice salad bowl full.
