RECENT PROGRESS IN CANADA. In the course of his speech in the Dominion Parliament on Thursday night, Sir Richard Cartwright emphatically made the claim that the Government is entitled to the confidence of Parliament and the people, and he gave reasons, first, that the credit of Canada stands at a higher point than it has ever before reached, and, second, that the trade of the country has been expanding by leaps and bounds during the last eighteen months. During the first twelve months of this period the exports had exceeded the imports by \$17,000,000, and during the succeeding six months the exports had exceeded the imports by \$20,000,000. Sir Richard pointed to the roll of victories which have followed the advent of the Liberal party to power as additional proof of the fact that the party merits the confidence of the people. It was with no small degree of pride that the Min-ister mentioned the fact that while eighteen months ago the Government had a majority of 22, now it can count 47 good men and true. He stated with an air of candor that he was not desirous of seeing the Opposition any weaker, because an eminent authority had declared that the best guarantee for good government was an active, wellorganized and unscrupulous opposition.
