Inspiring Message to Troops, Whose Performances Are Recalled as "Glorious" -- - "Where Canadians Are Engaged There Can Be No Giving Way."

OTTAWA, April 19 .- In anticipation of tremendous assault against the Canadian lines, Lieut.-Gen. Sir Arthur W. Currie, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., commanding Canadian Corps, issued a special order on March 27 and exhorted all ranks to advance or fall when they stood facing the enemy. He felt that Canadians would repeat victories of the past. A copy of the order has been received by an Ottawa woman from a relative overseas. It reads as follows:

"In an endeavor to reach an Immediate decision, the enemy has gathered all his forces and struck a mighty blow at the British army. Overwhelmed by sheer weight of aumbers, the British divisions in the line between the Scarpe and the Oise have fallen back fighting hard; steady and undismayed.

"Measures have been taken successfully to meet the German onslaught. The French have gathered a powerful army commanded by a most able and trusted leader, and this army is now moving swiftly to our help. Fresh British divisions are being thrown in. 
