The Liberal chieftain reviewed the Irish question briefly, and de-clared that John Redmond had died broken-hearted. Redmond had fol-lowed in the footsteps of Daniel O'Connell and Parnell, declared Sir Wilfrid, and had even succeeded in 1914 in having placed on the statute books of Great Britain a law for which O'Connell and Parnell had struggled, but failed to secure. The law was not put in force, however.

## MADE BY LONDON ELECTRIC CO.

Turns Down Proposals To Pur chase the Plant or Guarantee Revenue in Favor of Request To Ontario Power Commission For Power and Order From Dominion Controller To Keep Plant Running.

The special committee, dealing with the offer of the owners of the London Electric to sell the plant to the city or operate it for six months with a guaranteed gross revenue of \$12,000 a month, took only a short time to recommend filing the propositions. The Ontario Hydro Power Commission will be asked to furnish hydro power for the customers, and Sir Henry Draydon, power controller, will be asked to compel the company to operate the plant until such times as the customers can be taken care of,

"If the hydro can take core of the customers we need not waste a minute on that proposition," declared Ald. W. A. Wilson

"The propositions are three in unmber," continued the mayor. "The company will not lease the plant to us, so we need not consider that. The company will sell on the basis of arbitration values. This is out of the question. It is getting less than 2½ cents a kilo-watt and wants us to pay the and I cannot see those figures for a minute."
