Gen Kornitoff declined to speak over the telephone of the object of his visit. Count Benckendorff asked him to wait at the telephone, returned in a few minutes and said that he might be received in a half hour.

"General Kornitoff and his staff drove to the palace, where they were taken to the private apartments of the then empress, who appeared in a few moments, dressed in black and asked all to be scated. Her first words were:

"To what am I indebted for your isit?" General Kornitoff, rising, re-liled: 'I have come by the instructions of the council of ministers and I have to inform you of the decision of the provincial government.'

"The former empress, rising, said: I am ready to hear the Government's lecision.'


