INGERSOLL CHURCH TO RAISE FUNDS FOR SCHOOL BUILDING

Church of Sacred Heart Hopes
To Erect \$20,000
Structure.

INGERSOLL, March 23.—It has been estimated by Rev. Father Gnam of the Church of the Sacred Heart that the proposed separate school will cost about \$20,000. The matter is now receiving earnest consideration, and as a result of a plan submitted by Father Gnam, it is believed a sufficient sum to undertake the work will be available. It was explained by Father Gnam at a meeting called for the purpose that of the half of the required amount should be available when the work was commenced. He mentioned that there was \$3,000 in the bank to the credit of the school fund, and he considered it would be necessary to raise shortly \$7,000 additional.

With this object in view, a self-denial Sunday will be held in the Sacred Heart Church on March 29. Cards will be turned in setting forth the amount of individual contributions, part of which will be then paid and the balance in six months.

Father Gnam will give \$200 on that day, and also \$100 for every \$1,000 raised by the congregation up to \$5,000. He will also give an additional \$500 should the amount raised on self-denial Sunday be \$5,000 or more from the congregation.

FIREMEN'S CONCERT HELD AT ST. MARYS PACKED AUDITORIUM

ST. MARYS, March 23.—The largest attendance in years greeted the patriotic concert held under the auspices of the St. Marys fire brigade in the opera house Friday evening.

The main floor, gallery and aisles were packed to the doors. The program was half finished the gallery became so densely packed that some ladies and children became sick and were unable to get out. The program was a varied one, and the musical entertainment was rendered. "Scotty" Provan proved to be the Harry Lauder of the evening. A successful sale of the goods donated by the businessmen of the town was conducted by Capt. C. W. Coupland of the fire brigade. Among the donations was a 200-pound live hog, which was sold for \$10. A roster was sold three times, being each time donated back by the audience and brought a total of \$12.75. The proceeds, which amounted to a large sum, were for patriotic purposes. John P. manager of the Royal Bank, was chairman of the evening.

Kitchener Lad Shot Young Sister; Had Brother's Revolver

Clarence Engel Took Gun
From Coat—Bullet
Pierced Brain.

WATERLOO, March 23.—Clarence Engel, aged 19 years, accidentally shot and killed his sister, Margaret Engel, aged 19 years, while handling a revolver at his home shortly after 2 o'clock last evening. Clarence Engel, Norman, who is a clerk in Kitchener branch of the Bank of Toronto, had brought the gun home for the purpose of cleaning it. After he had finished cleaning it, he put it in his coat pocket and hung the coat on a chair. Clarence took the revolver from his brother's pocket and while looking at it, he fired the gun, the bullet striking the girl's brain just over the left eye. She lived until 3 o'clock, when she expired without gaining consciousness. Coroner Honneger was called and called an inquest for Wednesday at 2 o'clock.

Throat Trouble Cause Sudden Death of East Nissourian

Alexander Shaw Was Ill Only
Few Hours at Kintore.

INGERSOLL, March 23.—The death of Alexander Shaw, a prominent resident of East Nissouri, occurred this morning at his home near Kintore after an illness of only a few hours' duration from throat trouble. Mr. Shaw was taken ill Saturday night, and a few hours later a physician was summoned, but he passed away at 9 o'clock this morning. He was 60 years of age and unmarried. He was an active member of the Presbyterian Church at Kintore. The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at the Kintore Cemetery.

PIONEER OF LOBO, LIFELONG LIBERAL, BURIED AT ILBERTON

ILBERTON, March 23.—The funeral of A. A. Atwood was held at Littlewood Cemetery. The deceased is survived by his wife, Dr. Charlton, mayor of Weston, brother, and four sons and four daughters, James and Charles of Weston, Alvin, a teacher in Ottawa College, and Frank at home, and Mrs. J. S. Carmichael, Midway Creamery, Mrs. R. L. Lupton, Mrs. Dr. Coatsworth, Toronto, and Mrs. Rev. Young, London. Deceased was at one time the leading agriculturist in the district, and one of the leading fruit growers. He was largely instrumental in forming the Ilberton Fruitgrowers' Association. Not being able the past season to handle his large crop of apples, he wrote May 1, 1918, to the Ilberton Fruitgrowers' Association, offering them his supply gratis. The response was large, and many London citizens got their winter supply of apples free. He was at one time a member of Lobo council and was some years ago organizer for two different fraternal beneficiary societies. The Ilberton Lodge, A. O. U. W., and later the Ilberton Lodge, Royal Arcanum.

The pallbearers were Lieut.-Col. Bart Robson, B. D. Sells, E. Rosser, H. Hall, J. Cochran, T. Reeves, all members of the Royal Arcanum Lodge. Mr. Atwood was an active worker for the cause of temperance some years ago. In politics he was an active Liberal, a life-long reader of the Advertiser, and at one time an occasional writer for that paper. He took a lively interest in public matters.

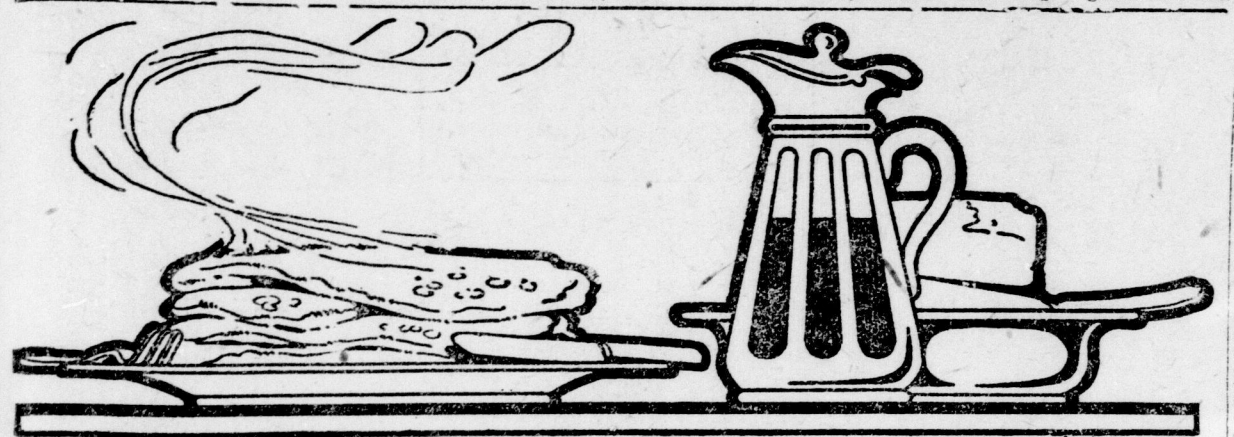

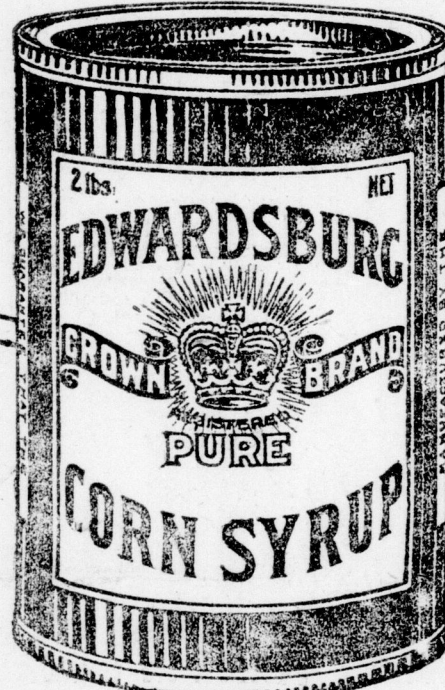
