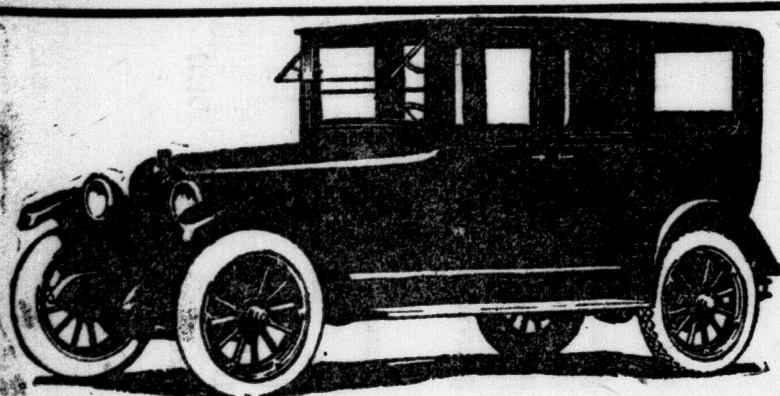

Degrees Are Conferred on Western Graduates by Chancellor Roche

Medals Were Also Presented At Largely-Attended Convocation in Wesley Hall Last Evening—Chancellor Tells of Steady Growth and Bright Future For Western University.

"It is a very easy thing to study sociology, but it is a very hard thing to go out into life and socialize society," said Dr. Howard P. Whidden, B.A., M.P., president of Brandon College, Brandon, Man., in his address to the graduating classes in arts and medicine at the annual convocation of the Western University, held in Wesley Hall, Friday evening.

Dr. Whidden urged the graduates to use the knowledge they had acquired in their college courses to enable them to better understand the needs and aspirations of their fellowmen and help to accomplish the greatest possible good for the greatest possible number. He advised them not to be discouraged because on first trial the principles they had learned in college halls would not work out in dealing with men and with groups and organizations of men. At each rebuff or reverse, they should study to learn more, and they should study men as well as books.

Going out into the world as educated men and women they should keep in mind the whole nation, yes, the whole world. They should think in terms not merely of the Western University life, but of a Canadian university life.

A national vision, much less a sense of world citizenship, was not possible to one who thought only of a small part of a province. Men of broad imagination and sound sense were needed in the world today, as never before. All should aim to bring education up to a higher standard, and make it more appreciable, not necessarily by robbing it of any of its traditional frills, but by making it practical and better suited to meet the actual needs of the world today.

chancellor of the Western University and chairman of the civil service commission, in his address paid a glowing tribute to the zeal and ability always shown for the former president of the university, Dr. E. E. Braithwaite, and expressed the hope that he would meet with all success in his new line of work. Roche referred to how the universities of Canada had suffered during the war. Students of the West-ern had done their part in the great struggle.

Steadily Growing. Before long the Western University expected, said Dr. Roche, to have as modern and as up-to-date buildings as

any institution of its kind, and looked for remarkable expansion and development in all its departments. Large money endowments had given old universities a better start than Western, but, as time went on, the Western University was growing in influence and the extent of its work, and many of its graduates had signally distinguished themselves in their own and other countries.

Years of turmoil and social unrest, as might be expected, were following the years of war. In Canada the restoration of half a million men back to civil life had been accomplished with a minimum of disturbance. Canada was faring better than some other countries. If the good sense of her people would only prevent liberty from developing into license and revolution from supplanting constitutional methods a great future lay before Canada. But the millennium had not yet arrived and the world was likely to be still further stirred by radical propaganda and social discontent.

Formed in Line. The graduates, members of the faculty, the senate and board of governors, marched in procession from the Y. M. C. A. to Wesley Hall before the convocation. The procession and recessional musical selections were played by A. D. Jordan. Devotional exercises, led by Rev. G. O. Warner, preceded the conferring of degrees.

The candidates were introduced by Dean Sherwood Fox of the arts faculty and Dean Paul S. McKibben of the medical faculty. The Hippocratic oath was administered to the medical graduates by Dr. R. Ferguson, B.A. The degrees were conferred, and special awards and medals presented by Chancellor Roche.

SEVERAL INDICTED FOR SUGAR PROFITEERING

NEW YORK, May 28.—Several indictments charging profiteering in sugar were returned in federal court here today. One indictment charged the Economy Wholesale Grocers Company and Abraham Gladstone of Chicago with having sold in New York on May 1, 50,600 pounds at 24 cents. They are alleged to have bought the sugar for 15½ cents. Another indictment charged D. O. Netter of New York and Morris Spitz of Waterbury, Conn., with having sold at 26½ cents a pound 52,000 pounds of sugar, which it was alleged cost them less than 19 cents.

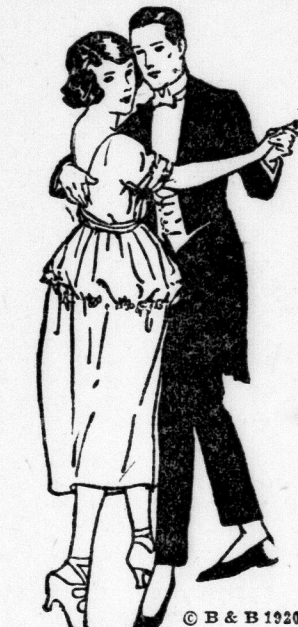

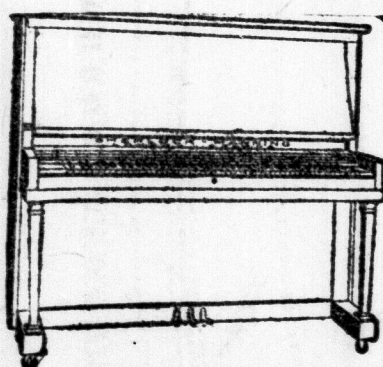
