



#### Degrees Are Conferred on Western Graduates by Chancellor Roche

Medals Were Also Presented At Largely-Attended Convocation in Wesley Hall Last Evening-Chancellor Tells of Steady Growth and Bright Future For Western University.

the Western University, held in Wesley Hall, Friday evening.
Dr. Whidden urged the graduates to use the knowledge they had acquired in their college courses to enable them to better understand the needs and aspirations of their fellowmen and help to accomplish the greatest possible good for the greatest possible number. NEW YORK, May 28 .- Several inlictments charging profiteering in sugar were returned in federal court here today. One indictment charged the Economy Wholesale Grocers Company and Abraham Gladstone of Chicago with having sold in New York on May 1, 50,600 pounds at 24 cents. They are alleged to have bought the sugar for 151/2 cents. Another indictment charged D. O. Netter of New York and Morris Spirt of Waterbury, Conn., with having sold at 26½ cents a pound 52,000 pounds of sugar, which it was alleged cost them less than 19
