WIFE ALLEGES THAT
HUSBAND PUBLISHED
A BOOK ABOUT HER

Decree of Divorce Granted in
Detroit To Former Can-
adian Woman.

WINDSOR, July 16.—Married in Wind-
sor in November, 1896, Isabel Murray,
former Canadian, was today granted a
millionaire Detroit manufacturer, by the
courts of that city.
The complaint was based upon
grounds of extreme cruelty. Mrs. Mur-
ray alleging that her husband had often
attacked her, inflicting severe injuries,
had called her the vilest names possible,
and had, a short time ago, published a
book on married life, telling of their re-
lations and heaping unbearable insults
upon her. This book had circulated
among all their mutual acquaintances,
and he had sent copies to every one
with whom he came in contact. Mrs.
Murray was given custody over five of
the eight children, two of whom are
married, while the others remain with
the father. A property settlement was
effected out of court.

CRUSADERS FOR
GOOD HIGHWAYS
REACH TORONTO

Michigan Pikers Complete
Another Leg of 1,300-
Mile Journey.

NORTH BAY IS NEXT

Tourists Dine As Guests of
Ontario Motor League—
Biggs Present.

TORONTO, July 16.—An hour or
more behind the scheduled time, the
200 touring members of the Michigan
Piker Association threaded into Toronto
about 8 o'clock tonight, dusty and
hungry, but bent upon enjoying their
visit to the utmost. They will leave in
the morning and continue their 1,300-
mile journey from Detroit and back
again, going by way of North Bay,
Sault Ste. Marie and Northern Michi-
gan.

They camped at London last night,
and today on their way to this city,
they were given warm welcomes at
Ingersoll, Woodstock, Paris and Ham-
ilton. They are carrying their camping
outfit, including field kitchen, through-
out the journey. To night they enjoyed
the luxury of sleeping in hotels.
As guests of the Ontario Motor
League, the tourists dined at the Kings
Edward Hotel, where they were formally
welcomed by Mayor T. L. Church.
Good roads was the theme of all the
hikers, including Hon. C. Biggs,
minister of public works for Ontario.
An open air meeting was held in
Queens Park tonight, when the Tour-
ing band that is in the party played, and
speeches were made. In all the speeches
emphasis was placed on the friendly
feeling existing between Canada and
the United States.

W. D. Edmura of Detroit, who is
the manager of the tour, climbed into
F. G. Erickson's aeroplane at Hamilton
this evening and was delivered in Tor-
onto in 25 minutes. He took an auto-
mobile and went out from this city to
meet the tourists coming in.

WOODSTOCK, July 16.—The members
of the Michigan Piker Association spent
a half-hour here this morning while
passing through on their tour. Large
crowds of citizens met them at Victoria
Park, where E. W. Nesbitt, M.P., and
Mayor Gagnier formally welcomed the
tourists. Dr. Douglas and Capt. Gal-
braith of the visitors replied. A feature
was the presentation to the visitors of
a souvenir in the form of small but at-
tractive booklets containing pictures
and facts about Woodstock.

MIX-UP AT INGERSOLL.
INGERSOLL, July 16.—Immense
crowds turned out this morning to wel-
come the members of the Michigan
Piker Association who arrived here
about 9 o'clock. They were behind
schedule time, and the confusion which
resulted for a time created some un-
pleasantness as to whether the tourists
were following a different route.
Finally, to the music of the Citizens'
band and escorted by the Motor Club,
they entered the town, where a short
halt was made by way of Thamesford.

PAID \$16 FOR BED
AND TWO BREAKFASTS

Exorbitant Charges Alleged
To Be Affecting Port Stan-
ley Season.

PORT STANLEY, July 16.—Exor-
bitant charges for bedding and hotel
accommodation at the lakeside is alleged
to be having a detrimental effect on
the number of visitors coming from
across the border. Two specific cases
being named as examples. In one case,
it is said that ten Clevelanders forced
to stay in the village overnight were
charged \$40 for sleeping accommodation,
two in a bed, while in another case
two people were charged \$16 for
one bed and two breakfasts.
It is stated that the management of
the trans-lake boat service has reported
having already felt the effects of the
excessive charges made at the lakeside
boarding houses. Property owners of the
boarding houses in defence point to the
shortness of the season, and claim a
right to reap the shekels while they
may.
There are not lacking old residents
of the port who state that Port Stan-
ley wants none of the summer visitors,
and, in fact, would be better without
them. They claim that the excessive
charges outside their purview, and the
only possible way of remedying things
appears to be the laying of a charge
of "charging excessive prices" against
some of the boarding-house keepers,
said a London visitor tonight.

GOVT. WILL RETAIN
ATHABASKA LANDS
FOR TAE DEPOSITS

OTTAWA, July 16.—An order-in-
council gazetted this week provides for
the withdrawal from sale, lease or set-
tlement of approximately 55,000 acres
of land along the Athabaska River in
Alberta. This action was taken, the
order states, because "it is confidently
expected that a successful process will
shortly be evolved for the extraction
from the tar sands of the Athabaska
River of oil, bitumen and other hydro-
carbons in commercial quantity."

WHISKEY AIDS "DRYS"

TORONTO, July 16.—The sug-
gestion that the "atrocious qual-
ity" of United States whiskey
sent to Scotland during the war
has sickened the Scotmen of
liquor is made by C. J. Bell and
J. S. Bailey, two officers of the
Dominion Alliance, who are
working for prohibition in Scot-
land. They claim that Glasgow,
Edinburgh, Inverness and Aber-
deen all show increasing public
sentiment against the licensed
saloon, and quote statements
that the whiskey from the United
States was so vile it was driving
Scotland to temperance.

ANOTHER CLUE
TO SMALL GOES
INTO DISCARD

Detective Mitchell Says Body
At Niagara Is Not the
Theatrical Man's.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 16.—
Another supposed clue to the missing
theatrical magnate of Toronto, Am-
brose J. Small, was dispelled tonight
when Detective Mitchell of the Toronto
police force viewed the body of a man
taken from the river here today
and stated positively that it was
not that of Mr. Small.
The body was recovered from Niagara
River near the landing of the "Maid
of the Mist" steamer that piloted
close to the falls, and as it was about
the size of the missing Toronto man
and badly decomposed, it was believed
to have been a case of old Niagara at
last revealing the mystery of the where-
abouts of Mr. Small's body.
Detective Mitchell's declaration that
it was not Ambrose Small's body that
was in the morgue here awaiting iden-
tification, carried weight with the local
authorities, as Detective Mitchell has
devoted most of his professional skill
and time in recent months in trying
to discover what happened Mr. Small
when he dropped out of sight on De-
cember 2, 1919. A reward of \$50,000
for the discovery of Mr. Small's where-
abouts, if he is alive, and \$15,000 if
dead, offered by Mrs. Ambrose Small,
some time ago, holds good until the
first of September.

DRY OFFICIALS
ANGRY AT WET
YACHTING FANS

Prohibition Agents To Investi-
gate Liner's Right To
Serve "Cheer."

HAD 500 PASSENGERS

Officials Claim Boat Was
Within Three-Mile Limit
During Race.

NEW YORK, July 16.—(By Canadian
Press).—Some of the people who will
necessitate the first race for the America's
cup off Sandy Hook yesterday had too
good a time, and the prohibition en-
forcement officers of New York are go-
ing to see about it.
James Shevlin, supervising prohibi-
tion enforcement agent for this district,
is incensed at the news that the Ward
Liner Orizaba, carrying 500 passengers
to view the cup contest, allowed alco-
holic beverages to be served on board
to the yachting enthusiasts. The Ori-
zaba has accommodation for many
more passengers, but it had not been
advised that the bag would be open.
Mr. Shevlin says that the Orizaba
did not clear for a foreign port, and
therefore, sailing as she does under
the United States flag, she had no right
to dispense cheer as she did. Moreover,
he alleges that the vessel was well
within the three-mile limit when her
passengers came out to watch the cup
of the eighteenth amendment.
The prohibition official is studying
the law today, and decides whether he
will seize the liner's supplies.
In the office of the steamship com-
pany operating the Orizaba, it was
stated that New York is not one of the
hydro-radii. Investigation was ab-

DRURY DEFENDS HIS
STAND ON RADIALS IN
WINCHESTER DISTRICT

ment of which he is head. The meet-
ing was held under the auspices of
the Winchester Agricultural Society
and Reeve James Ault presided. Mr.
J. W. Kennedy, M.P., Glenora, Mr.
Ross, M.L.A., Gengarry; J. McLeod,
M.L.A., Stormont, and W. H. Cassel-
man, M.L.A., Ingersoll, were present.
In the evening Mr. Drury spoke at a
band concert held in Chesterville. He
returned to Toronto tonight.

Mr. Drury reviewed the general policy
of the Farmer-Labor Government, and
told of what had been done by the
Government during the past session. He
also strongly defended the policy of
the Government in connection with the
hydro radicals. Investigation was ab-

COST HALF-MILLION
FOR HIGHWAYS TO
ENTER HAMILTON

HAMILTON, July 16.—Hon. F. C.
Biggs, minister of public works for
Ontario, submitted to the board of con-
trol here today his department's esti-
mate of the cost of an entrance to this
city for the Toronto-Hamilton, Dundas
street, and Guelph highways, the esti-
mate being \$400,000. Hon. Mr. Biggs
said he thought the work might be done
for \$350,000. City Engineer Gray esti-
mated the cost of the work within the
city to complete the highway entrance
at \$282,000, a total of \$682,000, based
on the public works department's esti-
mates.
City Engineer Gray's plan is not to
make the suggested fill from Carroll's
Point, estimated to cost over \$5,000,000,
and would provide an entrance only for
the Toronto-Hamilton Highway. Mr.
Biggs referred to the proposed fill as a
"one-eyed" project.
The board of control presided Hon.
Mr. Biggs a speedy decision on the
matter.
