TICKETS GOING FINELY AVERAGE WELL SUSTAINED

A Company of New York National Guard Coming—Processes and Attractions.

Altho yesterday was a wet day, the sale of the six-for-a-dollar tickets at the exhibition offices went merrily on and, for the first day of sale, the record was beaten. Possibly no better indication of the prospects can be had which, as last year, are good for admission to the grounds and to the grand stand any time during the first than the rush for these coupon tickets, week, for admission to the grounds at any time, and for the grand stand of the afternoon only of the second week. These tickets are good for use by out of town visitors, as well as in town, and orders have been received from Hamilton. One local firm placed an order for 500.

National Guards Coming.
Corporal J. Henry Dakin of Geneva, N.Y., has written to the manager of the Canadian National Exhibition to know if any arrangements could be made for Company "B," Third Regiment, National Guards, N.Y., to camp on the grounds for a week during the exhibition. Dr. Orr has written to say that there will be ample room for camping, and also plenty of restaurant accommodation at reasonable rates. If the company decide to come, they will be given the freedom of the grounds, and will be invited to take part in the spectacle, "The Siege of Sebastopol."

Processes of Manufacture.
Among the processes of manufacture already arranged for at the exhibition are the manufacturing of braids, ribbons, neckties, mesh work, nets in various colors, ladies' hosiery, vests and knitted goods of many descriptions, the making of silk, weaving of

carpets, manufacturing of boots and shoes, making of cut glass, spinning of cotton, weaving of cloths, manufacture of jewelry, lace making, wire weaving and half a dozen others.

Special Attraction Program.
The special attractions engaged for the exhibition so far include Marie La Blanche's sensational ride thru space; Alfred Yoder, the wire bender; Tetsumaru's famous troupe of Japanese, that are said to be without equal in or out of Japan; Spessard's performing bears; Power's hippodrome elephants, who have been creating sensations both in Europe and America during the past two years; Herzog's remarkable performing horses; the wonderful Merodia family; the second highest priced human act traveling today, and the three Sylvestros, who perform exceedingly clever aerial acts from bars held in the teeth of one of their number. In addition, the Royal Dragons will give their musical drive every afternoon and evening.

Suspected of Assault.
GUELPH, July 17.—(Special).—Three husky prisoners from Palmerston arrived here to-day in charge of Chief Armstrong and Constable Westgate of that place. They were arrested on Wednesday in Palmerston, and Magistrate McEwing, on the advice of High Constable Merewether, remanded them to the county jail here for a week, on a charge of vagrancy. Major Merewether suspects Sam Wilson, one of the trio, as being the tramp who assaulted Mrs. Harper at Mount Forest on Monday.

SIR HENRI'S DEBUT IN HIGH JUDICIAL OFFICE

First Canadian Member of Privy Council Hears City's Appeal in Tax Sale Case.

A letter confirming the cable received by the city solicitor last week, respecting the reserving of judgment by the privy council in the Russell tax sale appeal, arrived yesterday. Incidentally, it contains the information that Sir Henri Taschereau, recently appointed to the judicial committee of the privy council, and the first Canadian to be so honored, listened to the city's appeal, this being his first sitting. The letter, which is from the Freshfields Company, the legal firm of wide repute, and dated July 7, reads as follows:

"We beg to report that the argument of this appeal was commenced on the 3rd inst. and adjourned till and concluded to-day, arrived yesterday. Incidentally, it contains the information that Sir Henri Taschereau, recently appointed to the judicial committee of the privy council, and the first Canadian to be so honored, listened to the city's appeal, this being his first sitting. The letter, which is from the Freshfields Company, the legal firm of wide repute, and dated July 7, reads as follows:
