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Y.M.C.A. INVITES MAN IN OVERALLS

Charles R. Towson Shows Necessity for "Y" Spirit in Industry.

Enthusiasm was the key-note of the address given last evening by Charles R. Towson at the industrial section of the Y.M.C.A. dinner, held in the West End "Y."

Mr. Towson has been a leading exponent for fifteen years of what the Y.M.C.A. can do for industry.

Before the dinner Mr. Towson, in an interview with The World, said: "The association gives seventy-five per cent. of its services to the 'white collar' men, but it is not our object to do less for the clerical and professional classes, but to do more for industrial workers."

"We must make our buildings attractive to the man in overalls as well as the man in the white collar, and to do this the whole association must 'gear up.' It must know and sympathize with the viewpoint of these men so that they will fill our 'dormitories.'"

When asked if the Y.M.C.A. would solve the labor questions and satisfy the unrest, he stated: "The Y.M.C.A. in industry is not intended to deal with such questions as wages or hours of work, but it creates a spirit of fraternity among the men which will do more than anything else to solve these labor questions."

Employees Must Help.

In his luncheon address Mr. Towson said that the Y.M.C.A. could never succeed industrially without the cooperation of the employed class. "But," he declared, "I have yet to meet a group of sane business men who will not co-operate with the 'Y' when the matter is presented in a clear and full explanation."

In speaking for the employers, W. A. MacKinnon, of St. Catharines, said: "When employer and employee work together a bond of understanding is created that no Bolshevism can break. They are brought into sympathy in the Y.M.C.A. entertainments and games and so the 'Y' is of immeasurable value to the employer."

R. B. Boyes told of Y.M.C.A. work in the central west among the lumber-bucks where, when the Red Triangle first appeared, there was no instruction, either educational or religious, and no amusements. Now the camps have a constant supply of papers and magazines and have regular concerts and educational talks.

Most Educate Aliens.

J. Russell Harris spoke on "Canadianization of Industrial Aliens," and declared that this industrial question could only be solved by educating the alien to Canadian ideas.

The report of the commission on reconstruction presented by Lieut.-Col. G. W. Birks, of Montreal, was the feature of the morning session.

"There has been," said Col. Birks, "a great deal of talk about there being a new world after the war, but we are dealing with the same humanity as before. The Y.M.C.A.

Methodist Sunday Schools Present Annual Reports

Yesterday the members of the General Board of Canadian Methodist Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies convened in Wesley Buildings, in this city. In the absence of Rev. Dr. Chown the meeting was pre- sided over by M. E. Boughten of Manitoba. The report was presented by the general secretary, Rev. Frank Langford, B.A. Mr. Langford showed that there were 442,981 pupils in the Methodist Sunday Schools of Canada and Newfoundland. The enrolment of officers and teachers amounted to 41,- 382, and during the past year 10,567 young people from the Sunday schools had received into the membership of the church.

The financial statement, read by the treasurer, Mr. Plewman, of Toronto, showed a good balance. In addition to large sums raised for local purposes the Sunday schools and young people's societies had raised nearly \$200,000 for missions at home and abroad.

In addition to the foregoing, reports were read from the following field secretaries: Rev. W. E. Gallo-way for Alberta and British Columbia, Rev. C. W. DeMille for Saskatchewan, Rev. A. E. Hetherington for Manitoba, Rev. James King for the Maritime Provinces, and Rev. Manson Doyal for the central conferences. Miss Olive Ziegler gave an interesting report of her work as secretary of girls' work.
