Ottawa, Jan. 24. — (By Canadian Press.)—Further indication of the approach of complete demobilization is shown by a change of name of a number of the complete ber of Canadian military hospitals. With the exception of such institutions as will be required for the permanent forces, and those which were not required by the department, all except five of the hospitals hitherto directed by the Canadian army medical corps have been transferred to the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, and, with the change of management, the word "military" has been deleted from each title, showing that they have become civilian institutions. er of Canadian military hospitals.
