### CURLING

## IN THE WORLD OF LABOR

Adult women in the hosiery mills in Pennsylvania earn an average of \$5.10 per week; under the age of sixteen the weekly wages is \$2.82.

Ohio miners, in their state convention at Columbus recently, voted to abolish the defense fund as a result of one-half of one per cent of earnings.

The 300 locomotive engineers on the Mexican Central Railroad and its branches have decided to demand of the authorities an increase in wages sufficient to bring their pay to the standard pay of engineers in the United States.

It is reported from Chicago that the engineers on the western railways have gained advances in wages that will total about \$8,000,000 a year. The increases range from 5 cents to 12 cents per 100 mile run. Between 15,000 and 20,000 men are affected.

The American Sheet and Tin Plate Company announces an advance of 2 per cent in wages to all hot mill tonnage employees. It is said that the steel mill men will receive an advance of 2.5 per cent on March 1. Seven thousand mill and 6,000 sheet-men will be affected.

The French government set aside \$22,700 during the past year to aid organizations which provide assistance to their members during unemployment.

Some of the Portuguese who recently arrived at Honolulu, T. H., on the steamer Surverie have become dissatisfied, and left the plantations on which they had agreed to work. They leave to go to California.

A statute prohibiting the employment of a child under 16 years of age longer than ten hours any one day has been declared by the Oregon Supreme Court to be in force.

Factories in Japan do not stop work on Sundays, but usually the first half of each month are holidays.

The usual wages for laborers in Chili is \$1.50 to \$1.80 a day, but laborers are so scarce that they demand and get up to \$3 per day. There is talk of importing coolies.

The labor unionists of Tennessee favor legislation which will require the label of all penitentiary-made goods.

New South Wales Labor leader McGowan has given notice of his intention to bring in a bill declaring eight hours to be a legal working day, providing for the payment of overtime work, declaring void, and in some cases penal certain contracts and agreements, amending various acts and for other purposes.

Western miners declare that their growth was extraordinary during the past six months.

The International Association of Machinists has \$100,000 in the treasury.


