Giants Win In Ninth Inning

Drive in Five Runs and Defeat Tigers 8 to 6—Cobb Stays Out
Dallas, Texas, April 1.—Retribution overtook Harry Coveleskie, famed "Giant Killer" here today, in the form of a ninth inning assault by the Giants that netted five runs and turned impending defeat into a sweet victory. Coveleskie, who beat New York out of a pennant in 1908, was unable to stem a wild rush by his ancient foe, who made four straight hits off his pitching in a rally that made a record Dallas crowd wild with delight. The final score was eight to six, and the Giants, having won both games here, now lead in the series by two games to one.
There was no slugging today other than the punishment dealt out to the pitchers, but in anticipation of further trouble between the two teams Dallas turned out an attendance of 10,000 this afternoon. This not only breaks the local attendance mark, but is said to be a record for Texas.
Though paced early and often by the crowd, Tyrus Cobb declined to play. After his battle with Herzog last night Cobb declared he would not appear again in any of the New York games and Manager Jennings was unable to persuade him to change his mind.
Captain Jennings viewed the game from the bench. Herzog bore a few bruises as a result of his encounter with Cobb last night, but his reason for not playing was a lame arm. Kilduff substituted for him and played a great game at second base.
In order to break up the feud between the two teams, McGraw and Jennings called their players together in separate meetings this morning and requested that personalities be avoided in today's game. The early rounds were peaceful enough, but as the score saw-sawed the old pugnaic spirit was much in evidence. Both teams bitterly criticized Umpire Brennan for some of his decisions.
Salce and Dauss started in the box and when they retired after the fifth inning the score was three to two in favor of Detroit. Spencer having put the Tigers in the lead with a home run in the fifth inning. The Giants tied it up in the sixth on Coveleskie, but Tesreau was wild and the Tigers made another line hit to the centre field fence and put the tying runs on second and third bases.
Fletcher threw the stands into an uproar when he lashed a single to right field, scoring Robertson and Zimmerman. The Tigers loudly proclaimed that Kauff could not hit a left hander, but he drove a line hit to the centre field fence for a two-bagger.
The Tiger infield came in on the grass to cut off the run that would put the Giants in front. Holke grounded to Young, who made a nice throw to the plate. Fletcher appeared to be out, but Brennan said he had not been tagged. This decision provoked a vehement protest by Jennings.
On Rariden's grounder to Bush the Detroiters attempted a double play, but Young threw badly to first base, KauffCoveleskie, and walked. Bush also walk-
