# Train Hits Funeral **Coach at Haymarket** Square; Several Hurt Position Improved — German Assault Repulsed — Russians Fight Well and

Returning after the sad mission of burying his wife, who died suddenly a few days ago, Louis J. Massie and his little son, Leslie, were injured this morning and his brother-in-law, James Hunt, his son, James Edward Hunt, and John Rolston, a friend of the family, were badly hunt in what barely escaped being a tragedy while driving over south Haymarket square crossing.

They were in a coach driven by Patrick McCann of Erin street, when a freight train, which was backing up the line crashed into the rear of the coach and, taking away the right hind wheel, upset the vehicle and threw it against the post of the fence nearby, pinning the cocupants beneath the wreckage.

Mr. Hunt was the most severely injured, having several ribs broken and a bad bruise on the left side of his face,

Mr. Hunt, interviewed at the hospital by a representative of The Times said that he heard no warning, he saw the train as it was on top of the cab and he tried to get the door open, but it was stuck too tightly. "I had my little boy with me," he said, "and I tried to save him. I held him up clear of the wreekage of the roof and glass which pinned Rolston and myself down.
