Defaming Koran in Book by Him Canadian Press

esy of Dr. Taha Hussein, professor Arabic literature in the state university at Cairo is creating intense interest says a despatch to the Westminter Gazette from the Egyptian capital. The professor is accused of de-faming Islam in a book on pre-Islamic poetry in which he argues that po-tions of the Koran are incapable of literal acceptance.


