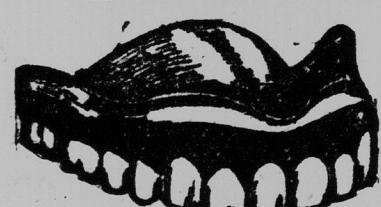

Increase in License Fees for Automobiles

Bill Goes Through Committee Stage at Fredericton—"Blue Sky" Stocks Law Also Passed.

Supplementary estimates to the amount of some \$10,000 went through yesterday, after which the House went to work on bills and remained at it until one o'clock this morning. The Premier announced that he would introduce a bill to double the one and two-cent amusement taxes. It was expected that this would meet with some opposition. It was intended to vote the extra \$36,000 estimated revenue from this source to hospitals.

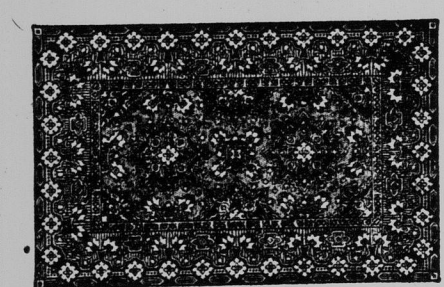
The "Blue Sky" law also passed the committee. As amended it provides that brokers and brokerage houses must take out licenses to do business with the Board of Public Utilities Commissioners and must submit a weekly statement of securities being sold. The board may order the suspension of the sale of any security at any time.

Hon. Mr. Hetherington presented a message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, in which he is presenting in the House a bill to amend the supplementary estimates and moved that said message and estimates be referred to the committee of supply. The items were: Steam navigation, \$1,000; ferry maintenance \$500; Natural History Society, \$800; Institution for the Adult Blind, Halifax, \$500; Home for Delinquent Women, Moncton, \$300; Riverview Hospital, \$250; expense in the matter of the Province of New Brunswick vs. C. P. Railway Company.

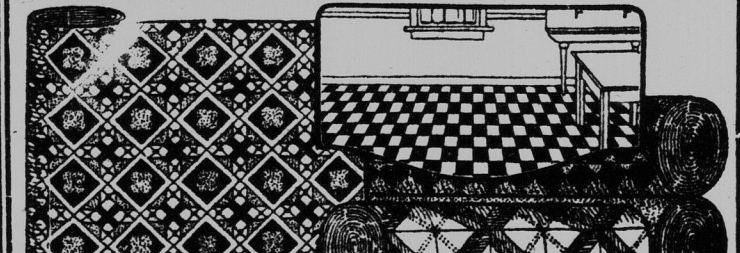
