

HINKS BALLOON MEN ARE ALIVE

Lieutenant Evans Believes
World Record Broken.

New York, Dec. 27.—Lieutenant A. W. Evans, returning today from Ottawa, where he organized a search for the missing States naval officers missing since they sailed from the Rockaway air station in a free balloon, two weeks ago, pressed confidence that the aviators are safe. He said he believed they had broken the world's record for continuous long-distance flight, and were so far from populated centres that they might not be heard from until next spring.

The former was recognized as the man who was alleged to have, in 1908, stolen a sum of \$600,000 from W. P. Reid, of St. John. At the time, however, he was said by Judge Choquette, on account of lack of evidence.

CAVE 30,000 YEARS OLD.

More Than 1,000 Mammoth in Moravian Find.

Vienna, December 28.—According to a report from Bruenn, a most important discovery has been made near Preuss, Moravia, of an enormous cave of the stone age, estimated 30,000 years old. The cave contains twenty skeletons of the family of a mammoth hunter and nearly as the remains of more than one thousand mammoths and many thousands of mammoth teeth, carefully sorted by the hunter. Some 40,000 utensils of various materials were also found, a number of which were anything but crude, indicating a considerable degree of culture.

NEW YORK STRIKE

New York, Dec. 27.—The Harbor Boatmen's Union voted tonight to reject the new working agreement for 1921 tendered by six hundred independent owners and to go on strike on January 1. Arthur Olsen, secretary of the union, declared that \$200 million will be affected. Coinciding with the announcement that the harbor boatmen would strike, a committee of Masters, Mates and Pilots' Union, claiming a membership of more than 2,500, declared that its organization would join in the walk-out.

MANY ON THE SEA DURING HOLIDAYS

Montreal, Dec. 27.—More Canadian sailors are spending the holiday at sea this year than for some time, according to Captain Tedford, marine superintendent of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Limited.

CURB MILITARISM

Amsterdam, Dec. 27.—A despatch to the Handelsblad from the Dusseldorf says the inter-Allied Rhine commission, alarmed because of the spread of militarism in German schools, has issued an order prohibiting the use of schools for military purposes on penalty of arrest and confiscation of the schools.

SALT HERRING MARKET

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 28.—British Columbia's salt herring packers are joining the salmon packers in the class of producers who are faced with difficulty in marketing their product. The bottom has dropped out of the herring market, and \$30 a ton is the top price offered for fish that cost from \$35 to \$38. As a result the canneries are being closed down and crews dismissed. Japan was one of the chief markets for British Columbia salt herring, and the Japanese financial collapse helped to flatten the market.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Unemployment in Canada is said to be about four per cent greater than would be normal at the time of year. This means that there are about 75,000 more men out of work in Canada this year than usual.

It was announced by John B. Haworth, of I. R. Fisher, 190 Carlisle street, and chief prohibition inspector, yesterday, that he had selected William Hughes of Fredericton for the position of deputy sheriff. Mr. Hughes is also tax collector for the city.

The funeral of Miss Ida LeGrin, who died here, was held in Fredericton yesterday morning from Christ Church Cathedral, where services were conducted by Very Rev. Dean Neale. Interment was in the rural cemetery.

A loss of \$105,000 was occasioned by a fire in Montreal last night in a building owned by Laporte, Martin Limited, wholesale grocers and liquor importers. Two firemen were injured.

Edward Freda, aged twenty-seven, a railway yard at Halifax yesterday afternoon. He was caught between a flat car and a buffer. He was a returned soldier and leaves a widow and one child.

It is reported that the Duke of Cornwall is ill on board the battleship Malaysia, now at Suva, and that his temperature is 101.

Three boys of August, Me., were drowned yesterday by skating through thin ice on the Kennebec river. A man and his son were drowned at Webster, Mass., yesterday, while fishing on the ice. The father was drowned in trying to save his son.

Four are dead in Fall River as the result of asphyxiation following a heavy holiday drinking bout. Three men and the wife of one of them were found in a room in which was a gas stove with the exhaust open. Two others died in North Adams, Mass., from the same cause. An Italian bride and groom were found dead in their room, and it is thought the bride tried to blow out the gas.

A despatch from Fargo, North Dakota, says that the First Farmers' Bank at Minot and the People's State Bank at Hatton had closed their doors.

The death of Dan Dessevey, at St. Catharines, Ont., on Sunday night, turned a drunken brawl into a cold blooded murder. Several Russians called at the home of a fellow countryman and demanded a drink. On being refused one of them, Steve Mazurko, pulled a gun and fired several shots, one of which struck Dessevey. This was on Christmas Day. The wounded man was taken to the hospital where he died on Sunday night. Mazurko now faces a charge of murder.

Charles Giles, a negro of Wilson, Arkansas, is a fugitive from justice following his slaying a planter, O. E. Craig, and his daughter, and wounding two sons on Saturday. Bloodhounds were unable to follow the negro's trail because of heavy rains.

HUNDRED PERSONS ESCAPE FROM FIRE

Minneapolis, Minn., Dec. 27.—More than 100 men and women escaped unhurt in severe weather when fire destroyed a four-story structure in the business district here today and damaged three other buildings.

The loss is estimated at more than \$200,000.

GERMAN COMPLAINT

Berlin, Dec. 27.—Complaint that Germany's foreign position is "continually becoming worse as the Versailles treaty is made by Dr. Walter Simons, the German foreign minister, in a signed article appearing in the Frankfurt Zeitung, today.

CRASH IN HIS CELLAR

Owner 'Phoned Police While Whiskey Cases Vanished.

Ottawa, December 28.—Hearing the noise of falling glass in his cellar a few nights ago, R. R. Fisher, 190 Carlisle street, dashed hurriedly down to see that his Christmas stock—two large cases of Scotch, valued at \$94—was safe. It was then, but Mr. Fisher decided to phone the police, asking them to keep an eye on the place. Before he could finish a second crash was heard, and this time the two cases had vanished. In the Police Court three well known Ottawa youths pleaded guilty to the theft and were remanded for sentence.

The annual Christmas tree and treat for the sailors was given at the Seamen's Institute last evening. More than 600 men were present.

Each sailor received a well-filled bag, most of which had been filled by the Ladies' Auxiliary although 200 had been received from the Seamen's Institute and W. C. T. Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Immigrants from the United States brought into Canada in November \$1,241,055 in money and settlers' effects. If the figures for December 1920 equal those for December 1919, the number of immigrants from the United States this year will be \$8,806, and the value of their belongings will reach \$18,225,220. In 1919 the total number of settlers who came from the United States was \$2,064. They brought cash and effects to the amount of \$18,419,406, or an average of \$853.76 a head.
