

"HAIL, ST. GEORGE." RINGS ACROSS THE WORLD TODAY

Englishmen the World Over Celebrated Today Feast of Patron Saint — Also Marks Anniversary of Canadians' Heroic Stand at Ypres.

Today all over the empire Englishmen are celebrating the occasion of St. George's Day, the day set apart in commemoration of England's patron saint. Besides being England's day, it is also Shakespeare's day, the name day of our king and the anniversary of the day in 1915 when the "old continentals" of the Canadian army, face to face with the flower of the Prussian army, brought undying fame to the land of the maple and consecrated the ground surrounding the historic city of Ypres with their blood. St. George's Day is a great day for England; how much greater is it for Canadians for the honor which it carries in marking the date on which the khaki army of the dominion, although practically unseasoned in active warfare and subjected to dense clouds of poison gas against which they had no protection, stoutly upheld the traditions of their forefathers and established themselves as a power with which to be reckoned. All day and all night and again through another day and another night they withstood the assault, filling gap after gap in the line, blocking the road of the German horse towards Calais and the English Channel, and writing the name of Canada in indelible letters upon the pages of British history.

The flag bearing the red cross of St. George will be flying to breeze and bated all over the empire today as it has been for more than 800 years. Throughout these eight centuries there has never been a year gone by when the significance of the day has not been recalled. Today Englishmen the world over will hark back to that day when the sturdy soldier-saint scored his triumph over the dragon, since when the blood red cross has been the symbol of liberty and fair play among the nations, giving and asking a freedom to live in equality and peace. And now, following the victorious years of the dominion, the English and the English soul could not respond in full measure to the tradition and the wealth of history which attaches to the day of St. George. Under the great grey flocks that guard our shores have ploughed to green again in majesty and splendour, striking fear into the hearts of those who would dare dispute with them the right of dominion. The stirring deeds of the incomparable Raleigh, of Drake, of Sir Richard Grenville in the good ship The Revenge, of the heroic Nelson with his immortal signal which today holds as great a power for Englishmen the world over as it did at the time of the Armada, the glorious defeat and death of Cradock and the equally glorious reprisal effected by Sturges, the unending vigil of Jelliffe, Beatty and their watchdogs of the North Sea—all these

as their inspiring banner the flag of St. George. St. George has been famed in art, literature, in the army and the church, there being over 200 churches named in his honor. He is referred to many times by Shakespeare in all his plays, the battle cries of "God and St. George" and "St. George for England" being oft quoted. THE LEGISLATURE

Matter of the Port of St. John Brought Up — Druggists Ask Legislation — The Fraser Bill.

Fredericton, April 22.—Like the professional engineers, the dentists and other professions, the pharmacists of New Brunswick are seeking to tighten the fences around their membership. A delegation representing the New Brunswick Pharmaceutical Association, including Fred Munro, J. B. Mahoney and George E. Coupe, with H. O. McLennan as counsel, appeared before the law committee this afternoon in support of proposed amendments to their registry act. This and a bill for the incorporation of a trust company were referred for private consideration, and after a short private session, were allowed to stand until the next meeting of the committee.

The bill to put into effect the proposals of the special committee on teachers' salaries also was introduced today. It provides for minimum salaries for all teachers of \$200, \$250 and \$300, according to the valuation of the school district. The government grant is increased, according to the length of term of service, as follows: First class, \$182 to \$175; second class, \$168 to \$160; and third class, \$154 to \$146, with half these amounts for assistant teachers. Special provision also is made for aid for poor districts.

Amendments were added to the bill relating to the Fraser Company bill today which are designed to give more adequate protection to the salmon fishery which are said to be dependent upon the spawning grounds in the Tobique. Members of both sides of the house criticized the lack of adequate protection, and provision was made that no dam should be built until the Ottawa fishery experts had determined that the fishways which were to be built would prevent substantial injury to the passage of the fish up the river. This bill had received extended consideration at the hands of the corporations committee, but members of that committee who had been engaged in other committee work at the time certain sections had been passed and others who were not members of the committee, took advantage of the opportunity when the name before the committee of the whole house to present their views and seek the amendments which they considered necessary.

Hon. Mr. Roberts gave notice that on Saturday next he would move, seconded by Mr. Potts, the following resolution: "Whereas, that as it is in the interests of the province of New Brunswick that the port of St. John should be developed as a port of call for the handling of the commerce, both inward and outward, that will naturally seek it as a port and

Whereas, the port of St. John has for twenty years or more, been one of the two ports on the eastern coast of Canada which have been availed of during winter, for the inward and outward overseas trade of Canada, and

Whereas, it has been abundantly manifest for several years, owing to the development of such trade or traffic, that the said port is unable to handle such increased trade with the promptness, dispatch and economy necessary to such trade and

Whereas, the St. John Valley Railway has been built at great expense to this province and needs to be extended to connect with the transcontinental rail of Canada, so as to afford an additional facility for the said sea-board commerce of Canada, and so should be taken over and extended and operated by the government of Canada.

Therefore, resolved, that this house approves of and directs that a delegation composed of members of this house from both sides, and others, be sent, at an early date to Ottawa, to confer with the federal authorities of Canada, and to urge upon said authorities the vital necessity, not only in the interests of the port of St. John, and the province of New Brunswick, but of that of all

Canada, that such additional facilities as heretofore mentioned in this resolution, be supplied the said port without further loss of time, and that such delegation be named by a committee of this house, appointed by the honorable speaker of this house, and composed of an equal number from each side of the house, so far as the house membership of the delegation is concerned, and

Further resolved, that the necessary traveling expenses of said delegation in consequence of said conference at Ottawa be a charge upon the public funds of this province.

The House again went into committee with Mr. Leger (Westmorland) in the chair and agreed to a bill to amend the New Brunswick Elections Act, with an amendment which provides that copies of the voters' list may be obtained from the provincial secretary-treasurer on the payment of a price per folio to be determined by the King's printer.

The committee next took up consideration of a second bill to amend the New Brunswick Elections Act. This bill makes provision for the addition to the voters' list of the names of qualified electors which had been inadvertently omitted.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that the two bills to amend the Elections Act would be incorporated into one.

The bill was agreed to. Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced a bill to amend the Workmen's Compensation Act. He explained that the amendment provided for increased amount for funeral expenses, for increased allowances to widows and children, for increased allowances for permanent partial disability and other matters. He said also that changes were made in regard to payment for first aid. Provision also would be made that in cases in which any employee was injured by the use of this scheme under which medical and hospital expenses were paid for his employees, he would be given credit for it to the discretion of the board.
