ST. JOHN MEN VICTORS AGAIN

Crack Signallers Once More Lead All Canada

SIXTH SUCCESSIVE YEAR

No. 3 Section Men Made Very Near the Possible Number of Points—The Standing of Signallers of New Brunswick Regiments

For the sixth successive year the crack body of signallers from St. John, N. B., Co. No. 8 section, commanded by Lieut. Allan Leavitt, have captured championship honors in competition with corps from all Canada. This company, though small in numbers, has made an enviable record for itself in the field of practical signalling experience and tactical work, and since its organization a few years ago by Captain T. E. Powers, divisional signalling officer for the maritime provinces, has rapidly advanced in honor and rank.

To win championship honors is really becoming nothing more than a habit with the members of this corps and they are being heartily congratulated upon having done so again, for the sixth time. They have a total of 2410 points, which is very near the possible aggregate, while their nearest competitors are No. 8 section of Kingston, another crack corps, with 2291 points. The total signaller score for the year is 10,000 points.
