

DEMANDS DEATH FOR BOLD WITHOUT

Relentless Indictment Of Prosecu-

Paris, Feb. 14—Demanding the death sentence on Bolo Pasha yesterday, M. Monet, prosecuting counsel, remarked: "The eyes of our Allies are on us. In the eyes of France we are judging a man who attempted to do in France what has been accomplished in Russia. We must show no weakness. The world is fighting for its liberty and is in expectancy.

"In times of peace I have stood here many times asking the death penalty for a miserable individual guilty of murder, and it was not without a twinge of regret. But today, without pity, or mercy, but with a sence of stern duty to my country and our Allies, I ask for death."

Mayor and Citizen Taken Prison-ers On Submarine as Hostages

For Germans Said To Be Interned There

London, Feb. 14-Major General William R. Robertson, the Daily Chronicle declares on its own information, will re-main chief of the imperial staff, with the full approval and confidence of the London, Feb. 18-The war cabinet. Major General Wilson, the sub-chief, will continue to be the principal British representative at Versailles. The Chronicle adds that if, as has been reported, an exchange of offices between Generals Robertson and Wilson was contemplated at any time it has now been abandoned.

London, Feb. 18—The inter-allied council on war purchases and finance has concluded its session for February, it is announced officially. Programmes of requirements for February and March presented by the government of Great British, France and Italy involved requests contemplated at any time it has now for credits from the United States treasbeen abandoned.




