THE MERCURY TOOK DROP OF 60 DEGREES Rain, Sleet, Snow, Windstorm And Freezing Weather In States

MANY LIVES LOST Property Damage is Millions of Dollars—Several People, Caught by Sudden Change, Are Frozen to Death—Montreal Catches it Severely, Too

(Canadian Press) New York, Nov. 13—Nearly a score of deaths, a property loss of several million dollars, and much suffering and inconvenience resulted from a violent change of temperature, the preceding storms and the succeeding cold and snow that beset the central portion of the country, on Saturday and Sunday.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 13—The north-south line of the storm, which swept over Oklahoma and Texas on Saturday afternoon and Sunday, cleared to leave brought the coldest weather for this date in twenty years.

Montreal, Nov. 13—Following a mild and rainy storm yesterday afternoon and last night, more wintry weather set in today, with the temperature registering from ten to twelve degrees below the freezing point.

Train Wrecked Greenboro, N. C., Nov. 13—The New York Atlanta and New Orleans Limited train on the Southern Railway, which left New York at 4.30 p. m. and Washington at 1.45 p. m., yesterday, has been wrecked near this place, one person is reported dead and several injured.

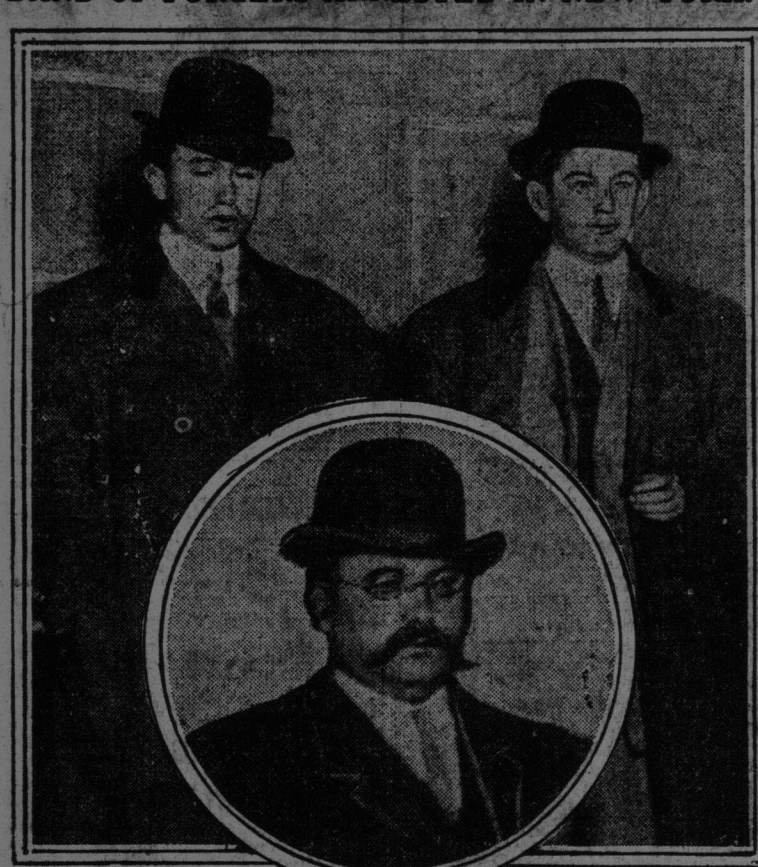

BEATTIE LOSES APPEAL

TRAGEDIES IN NEWS OF A DAY

Macon, Ga., Nov. 13—Mrs. Lizzie McCall, aged seventy years, was shot and killed by her husband, Roger Call, aged seventy-one years, while she lay asleep in her bed at her home here last night. McCall then turned the revolver upon herself and when the sheriff broke down the door he was found lying on the bed sound asleep, with a shroud on his side. The old man declines to make a statement, and no cause for the murder is known.

Ottawa, Nov. 13—As the direct result of taking an overdose of a sedative containing a mixture of chloral and potassium Alex. Sinclair Craig, of Montreal, who has been spending two months in the city, died here last night. Mr. Craig took nearly the whole prescription, a little less than two ounces, instead of a teaspoonful, as directed. He was taking it for fits of nervousness.

MENACE TO THE CITY'S HEALTH

Forty Thousand Cartloads of Refuse Accumulated Because of New York Strike. New York, Nov. 13—If the garbage gatherers' strike is not broken today the health department will step in to save New York from the evil effects of some 40,000 cartloads of refuse that has accumulated since the men who drive the street cleaning department wagons quit work because of the strike.

THE 'STRONG MAN OF CHINA' ARRIVED IN PEKING TODAY

Yuan Shi Kai to Give Tottering Throne His Support—Chi Fu Goes Over to the Rebels—Is a City of 40,000 People. Shanghai, Nov. 13—Chi Fu went over to the revolutionists at three o'clock. There was no fighting. The rebels took possession of the Lao-Lai yamen, the telegraph office and the forts. Chi Fu has a population of about 40,000 and is important as a treaty port and coaling station. The steamers plying between Shanghai and Tien-Tsin touch here, and there is a considerable trade in sailing ships with the other ports of China. It has fairly large foreign colony. It is located on the north coast of the Cheung-tung peninsula and is about 200 miles east of Tien-Tsin.

(Canadian Press) London, Nov. 13—A news despatch from Tien-Tsin announces that Yuan Shi Kai arrived in Peking this morning. He will have an audience with the regent today to discuss the situation. It is said that he will not accept the premiership. London, Nov. 13—A news despatch from Tien-Tsin says that, acting upon urgent orders, 1,500 Cossacks left Vladivostok today for Peking.

London, Nov. 13—The unionist caucus at the Carlton club today carried out its rearranged programme and unanimously appointed A. Bonar Law leader of the party in the House of Commons. Walter Hume Long and J. Austen Chamberlain, who had expressed their own aspirations in order to avoid a break in the Conservative and Liberal Unionist groups, in the party, respectively proposed and seconded the nomination, and as no other name was submitted, the motion was adopted by acclamation.

SAYS WESTERN CROP OUTLOOK IS NOT NOW VERY BRIGHT

Change in the Weather Has Caused a Set Back in Report of Grain Dealers' Association. Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 13—(Canadian Press)—Further details of the Northwest Grain Dealers' Association report on the crop situation tend to make the outlook not only for this year, but also for next year, anything but bright. The report says that only seventy per cent of the grain has yet been threshed and that about fifty bushels of grain are in the stack with no immediate prospect of seeing a separator.
