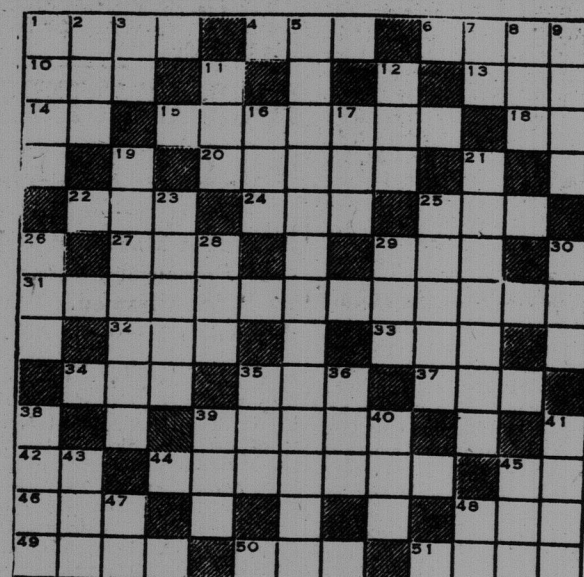

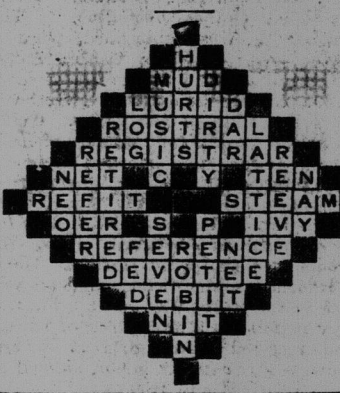

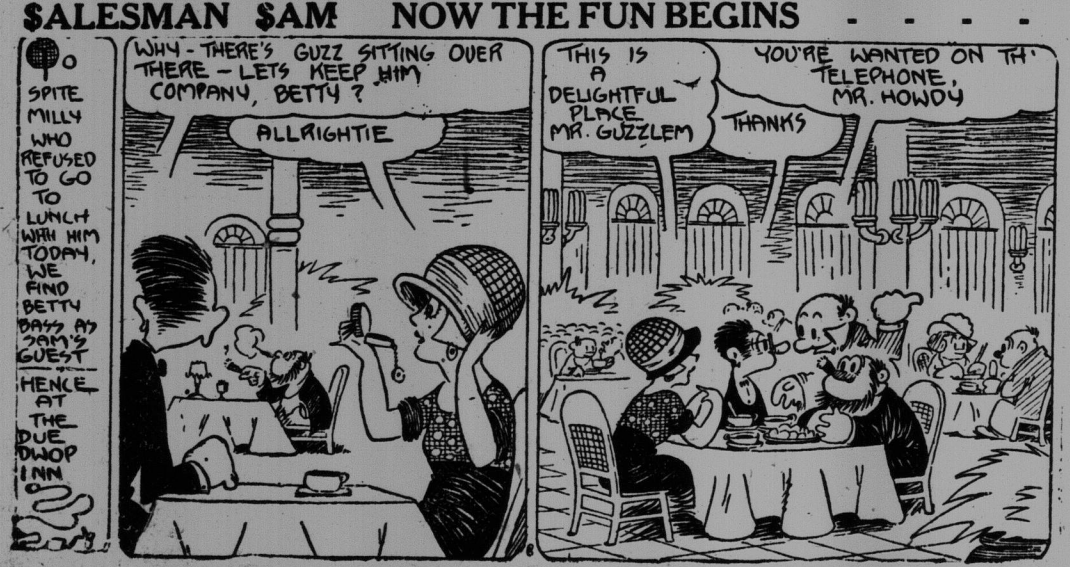

The jabot was never more beautifully handled than this season, and is featured on the frock of crepe de chine or satin as the sole trimming.

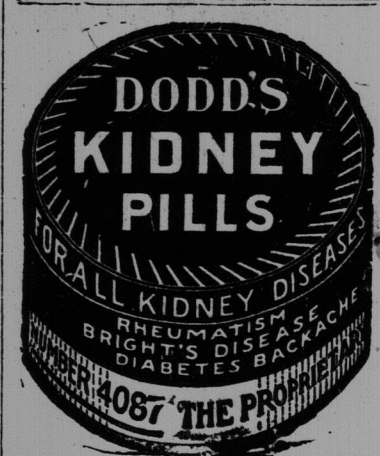
MORE EMBROIDERY
