

SHAFT IS UNVEILED BY CAPT. THURBER FOR TOWNSPEOPLE

Largest Turnout Ever Witnessed in Freeport Attends Ceremonies

NAMES OF HONORED ARE ON MONUMENT

Speakers Spurn War Spirit, But Laud Those Who Made Sacrifice.

FREEPORT, Aug. 11.—Undoubtedly the largest number of people ever assembled in Freeport on one occasion, witnessed on Sunday the unveiling of Freeport's memorial to her sons of the World War. Ideal weather conditions prevailed, and many visitors were present from Westport, Tiverton and points farther distant. The exercises took place on the church lawn, the choir and speakers being seated on the terrace to the north of the monument. Miss MacLennan was the organist for the occasion.

The service opened with the singing of the Doxology, followed by the invocation by Rev. H. H. Phinney, pastor of the Westport Baptist church. After the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers," Mr. W. V. Perry, chairman of the Memorial Committee, formally presented the monument to the people of Freeport, which was accepted by Rev. E. C. Prime, of the First Baptist church, Bridgewater, Mass., and formerly of Freeport, who presided throughout the service.

Rev. A. H. MacLeod, pastor of the Tiverton Baptist church, offered the prayer of dedication. The choir sang two memorial anthems and the Westport quartette sang a very appropriate selection.

DEDICATION BY VETERAN.

The dedicatory address was delivered by Rev. P. M. Hamilton, pastor of the Freeport Baptist church, who saw active service overseas. His address was very timely, and while he did not laud the spirit of war, he did honor to those who were willing to give their lives for the cause of freedom.

To Captain George A. Thurber, father of the late Lieut. S. W. Thurber, was given the honor of unveiling the monument. Sgt. Bernard Bushie, second son of Mr. and Mrs. David Bushie, who served overseas in the 29th Battalion, receiving the Military Medal and Bar, read the names of the fallen men, as the relatives and friends placed their beautiful floral tributes about the monument. King's "Recessional" and the National Anthem were then sung, and Rev. A. H. MacLeod pronounced the benediction.

THE MEMORIAL.

The granite monument stands midway between the church and parsonage, and is the work of Mr. Rice, of Middleton. A splendid new flagpole has also been placed directly behind the monument, and a new flag floated over the monument yesterday. The following names are engraved upon the stone: Lieut. S. W. Thurber, died in France, Oct. 14, 1918; Horace A. Blackford, killed in action, June 2, 1918; Noble E. Lewis, killed in action, Oct. 31, 1917; Hamilton E. Elliott, killed in action, June 22, 1917; Melburne A. Tins, died April 2, 1916; Stephen E. Shortliffe, killed in action Oct. 26, 1917; Charles E. Hersey, died of wounds April 10, 1917.

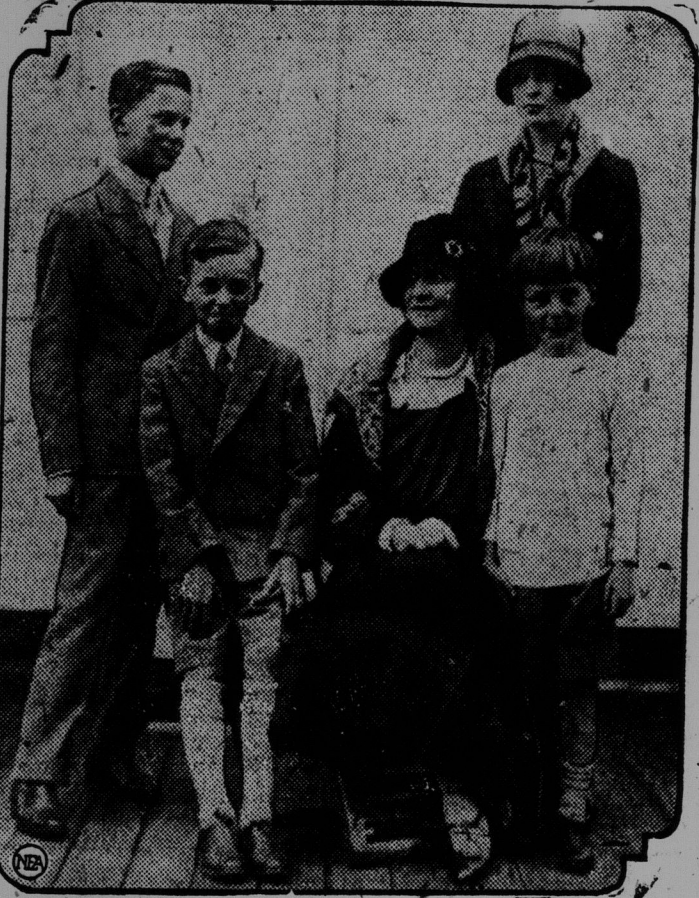

LORD BLYTH HURT IN ESCAPING BLAZE

Two Women Injured When Fire Damages Mansion in Britain

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Lord Blyth's mansion, Blythwood, at Sandhead, Essex, was seriously damaged by fire at an early hour this morning. The contents, including valuable pictures, were destroyed.

Lord Blyth, who is 68 years old, was being lowered from a window with a rope around his shoulders by his nephew and heir, Hon. Rupert A. Blyth, 21-year-old, when the rope slipped and the Lordship fell. One of his ankles was injured.

The housekeeper, an elderly woman, was badly burned while running along a blazing corridor arousing the inmates.

The cook was injured while escaping from the flames, the ladder on which she was descending breaking before she reached the ground.

Two dogs perished.
