## PLANNED MURDER; HIMSELF A VICTIM

Indian Police Official Caught  
In His Own Snare.

Mid Himself, and Inspector, Lying Down  
on His Bed, Was Slain by  
Fellow-Constabulars.

LUCKNOW, Oct. 31.—A murder which reads like a page from a sensational romance has been committed on the Grand Trunk Road, near Cawnpore.

The victim was a police inspector attached to an outlying station on the road, and was himself the principal instigator of the crime. His death was due to a mistake by two fellow-constabulars.

A traveler arrived at the place, and after having sought lodgings with the inspector, confided to him that he was anxious about the safety of a large amount of gold which he had with him.

Some time afterwards he observed two men dig near the house, and overheard a remark which roused his suspicions, and led him to suppose that the excavation was intended for his grave.

He was unable to obtain help on the spot, and, abandoning his bags, he fled. It appeared that the inspector, who had drunk considerably during the day, lay down on the bed which had been provided for the traveler, and fell asleep.

The constabulars entered the station late at night, and not finding the inspector, decided to execute the murder in his absence. They went to the inspector's quarters, and having obtained his sword, entered the bedroom where in the darkness they hacked the sleeping man to pieces.

When they discovered their mistake they hurriedly buried the murdered man in the prepared grave and removed the traces of the crime.

Next morning a European officer accompanied by a few men, passed along the road on the way to the station, and the traveler, descending from his hiding-place, disclosed what had happened. The constabulars were placed under arrest.

Last night, in a resort on Montmartre, where city officials and opera stars are well known, a lawyer drew a coin from his pocket to pay for his refreshment, whereupon a young woman of engaging manners approached and announcing herself as a fetishist, asked permission to bite the coin for good luck.

The lawyer was compliant, but the girl instead of biting the coin, swallowed it. Despite her alluring smiles the lawyer's compliance changed to resentment. He called a policeman and the girl was arrested.

At the station house the commissary ordered an emetic, when to the consternation of those present there came into view, not the loins, but two terracotta pieces. The commissary urged a second effort and the patient rid herself, not of one, but two coins of the desired denomination. Then she was locked up. LIPTON DINED BY BOSTON FRIENDS

Hearty Toasts to King Edward and Roosevelt.

Sir Thomas Says He Is Doing His Best to Take the International Cup Back to England.

BOSTON, Oct. 31.—Toasts to President Roosevelt and King Edward were drunk amidst great cheering, and representatives of Boston attended a banquet given by the city of Boston to Sir Thomas Lipton, yachtsman, at the Hotel Somerset to-night.

The greeting to Sir Thomas was of the heartiest kind. Former Congressman Samuel L. Powers was the toastmaster and the speakers were Sir Thomas Lipton, yachtsman, at the Hotel Somerset to-night.

The toast to President Roosevelt was proposed by Mayor Fitzgerald and that to King Edward by Mr. Powers. Both toasts were drunk standing.

In introducing Mr. Powers, the toastmaster, Mayor Fitzgerald dwelt upon the prominence of Boston in the history of the defense of the American cup. He said that Sir Thomas typified the Boston merchant and the Boston spirit.

Former Governor Long, in responding to the toast "The United States," referred to the many victories won by America and Great Britain. He said that the United States loved its old mother, and that, if the mother wishes her to be a United States would take her in by its own friends.

Turning to Sir Thomas, the speaker said: "Your name is a household word in America for pluck and fair play. We are all hoping you will in the world race, and if you do you will get a cheer from all our hearts."

In introducing the guest Mr. Powers said that no one had done more than Sir Thomas to bring the United States and Great Britain closer.

In his address Sir Thomas said that if good wishes had meant anything many times. Speaking of the future, he stated that he had good ground for the assertion that another challenge would be forthcoming before he left the United States.

He declared that he was doing all in his power to bring about another contest for the America's cup. "This cup," he said, "originally belonged to England, and I think that a trip back to England would not do it any harm."

Sir Thomas declared with emphasis that in his opinion, international contests in the field of sport brought about more friendly feelings between the people of the competing countries. He said that he was a firm believer in international contests and that they brought about a greater knowledge of each other and strengthened the ties of good will between the countries and civilization in general.
