DAUGHTER OF JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER DEAD

It is Asserted that the Government is Trying to Alleniate the Catholics Against the Vatican

CANNES, Nov. 14.-Mrs. Charles A. Strong, daughter of John D. Rocke-feller, died at three o'clock this morn-Mrs. Strong had been ill for some time and suffered a paralytic stroke on Nov. 12, after which she sank slowly until the end. The body will be sent to America the end of this week.

Mrs. Charles A. Strong showed symptoms of the illness four years ago, when living in Lakewood. She withdrew from the social life at Lakewood and lived very quietly. About two years ago she was taken to Cannes for her health but the change brought no material improvement in her condition.

Mrs, Strong's husband was a professor of philosophy at Bryn Mawr and later a professor in Columbia University. It was said last spring that the illness of Mrs. Strong was the principal reason why John D. Rockefeller con-
