OTTAWA, June 3.—Immigration returns for April show the total arrivals were 24,237, a decrease of 5,486 compared with previous April. Immigration from the United States totalled 12,609, an increase of 3,525 or 39 per cent. Immigration via ocean port totalled 11,628, a decrease of 9,0041 or 44 per cent.


