### Church and State in Japan.

An interesting question has arisen in Japan as to the part which shall be taken by Buddhist priests in the new popular government. A politico-religious association, known by the high sounding title of "Sovereign-revering and Buddhabelieving Grand Combination," has recently been established, and is supposed to be mainly composed of priests. However this may be, the chiefs of all the Buddhist sects lately met in one of the principal temples of Tokio, to discuss the subject of the priests' duties in regard to current practical politics, and to lay down certain rules for their guidance. The result of the conference was a series of resolutions to the effect that no priest should be pennited to join a political party, that a priest should under no circumstances whatever be allowed to labor for a political party, and that every priest should be enjoined to warm his flock against the danger of allowing political inferences to interfere with social intercourse, and against breaking be least for the purpose of holding political meetings or delivering speeches connected with political parties. Evidently the Buddhist priests do not believe in the union of church and state.
