

MILL OWNERS SEEK RELIEF FROM COURTS

Protest to Governor of Rhode Island Against Mass Picketing

Providence, R. I., March 10.—Rheumatism by individuals to the courts to obtain an injunction against mass picketing, adopted this week by striking operatives at Rhode Island textile plants affected by the strike, was the forecast today. In a statement issued at noon, Governor San Soule declared he had advised the manufacturers, who have protested to him against what they termed "unlawful mass picketing" at mills, to seek relief in the courts. Strike leaders in the Pawtucket and Blackstone Valleys replied with statements that picketing would proceed "in defiance of any injunction."
