Boston, Nov. 2—Handicap lightship No. 4 was placed on station in Vine and Bond streets this morning by the regular relief lightship No. 1, which has been marked and is to be replaced by the regular lightship No. 4 on Nov. 10.

Notice is also given that on or about Nov. 10, 1919, the signal at the station on the southern point of Connaught Island between the entrance to Margaree Bay, will be changed from a 10 inch steam whistle to a 10 inch bell, operated by compressed air. No change in the character of the signal will be made which will remain, as heretofore, blast of four seconds duration, separated by alternate silent intervals of 10 and 9 seconds.

THE EXHIBITION—Mr. C. A. Everett, secretary of the Exhibition Association, has completed a statement of the finances of the last exhibition. The receipts from all sources were \$194,450 and the total expenditures \$20,844.30, leaving a deficit of \$1,384.35. The income account shows that \$4,084.65 was realized from admissions at the gates, \$2,043.45 from entrance fees and privileges, and \$2,000.45 from the grand stand and amusement hall. These with the donation of \$300 from the St. John Railway Company and \$50 on the capital stock account comprise the entire income. The sum of \$8,439.60 for prizes and judging was expended, against \$8,506 in 1918, \$1,500 less in grants was received.

PROPERTY MATTER.—At Chubb's corner, Saturday, Auctioneer Gero sold to Mr. A. P. Barnhill for \$7,100 the Barnhill building on Princess Street. The Paddock street property was withdrawn at the upset price of \$2,750; the Maxwell property at \$7,800. The Manuquah property was also withdrawn. It is said that Mr. F. W. Stockton has sold to the owners of the Mineral Products Co., now operating in Albert county, his manganese mine near Newton, Kings county, and that work will be kept up all winter. The brick dwelling on Princess Street owned by Mr. F. W. Stockton has been sold by Mr. F. M. Bailey to Dr. Foster for \$10,000. It is understood, about the fact that the property was sold.

THE WAR IS ON.

Temperance People of Westmorland Organize to Retain the Foot Act.

MORLEY, N. B., Nov. 6.—The temperance people of Westmorland met in convention here this afternoon, and organized for the Scott act campaign. An association was formed, officers elected and steps taken to completely organize throughout the county. Dr. Borden, of Sackville, was elected president; Judge Emmerson, secretary and vice-president; to look after organization were appointed in different parishes. The attendance was fair and the convention set earnestly about preparing for what they consider the hardest Scott act campaign they have ever had. Prof. J. P. Smith and Rev. Dr. McLeod are among the outsiders whose services will be engaged to stump and work for the act.
