Canning Items. A number of our people attended the induction service of Rev. Mr. McCurdy at Canada on Thursday last.

County Court. The June term of the County Court was held on Tuesday, Jud. C. Chipman presiding.

There were two cases tried, King vs. Hilsley, an appeal from the Canada Temperance Act; Banks vs. Dunn an action for wages. In both of these judgments were reserved.

Ambrose DeAdder, who was tried recently in the Judge's Criminal Court and pleaded guilty of larceny received his sentence on Wednesday morning. In this case he was sentenced to three months with hard labor in the county jail.

The Halifax Presbytery met in the Canada Presbyterian church on Thursday last week, and inducted Rev. J. F. McCurdy to the charge of the church. The service of induction began at 2 o'clock. Rev. Dr. Miller, of Coburg Road church, Halifax, addressed the minister, Rev. Mr. Crawford, of Windsor, addressed the people, and Rev. David Wright, of Wolfville, preached the induction sermon.

The resignation of Rev. John Hawley, of Waterville, was also before the meeting, and was accepted. It is understood that Rev. Mr. Hawley goes to P. E. I. The call from Yarmouth church to Rev. Mr. Ramsay, of Middleton, was presented, and after hearing representatives from both churches the matter was left in the hands of Presbytery, which decided that Mr. Ramsay remain at Middleton.

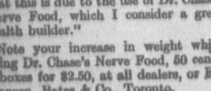
