Dear Sir,—I, until yesterday, like a good many others, have been kceping the sidewalk in front of where I live froze on—and which is safer to walk upon than the frosty granolithic—but a great many others never make any attempt to clear their sidewalks; and when the snow gets too kleep in these places some men, a horse and snow plays are sent to greate all ever the

city.

This snow-plowing, I understand, is paid for out of general taxes, and this is where I enter a protest.

Of course the present system acts like the fellow said about his well-

like the fellow said about his well-matched team of horses—one was willing to do all the work, and the other was willing he should. Now, I believe in making them pull together, and then they can draw a bigger load. I have over 100 feet fromt to clean, and to that I do not for a moment object; but I do most emphatically object to paying, in addition, for cleaning the sidewalks of a lot of men who are, physically, as able to shovel snow as I am, and financially, perhaps, far more able to pay for it. perhaps, far more able to pay for it their time on the same principle as another government does with the prohibition question?
