Genuine meteorites are curiosities highly prized by museums and scientific collectors. Professor St. Meunier of the Natural History museum of Berlin paid as much as \$5 per gram for a meteorite. It is there-fore conceivable that sharp practices should be resorted to by dealers in scinntific curiosities. A band of mete-orite counterfeiters was recently cap-tured and considerable evidence obin thods of deceiving the gullible collector. The members of this band were Corsicans. It was their practice to obtain natural rock resembling meteorites as closely as pos-sible and then to burn them in or-der to produce the black crust which is one of the earmarks of every genaine meteorite. were coated with lampblack dissolvwere coated with lampotack dissolved in molten sulphur. It seems, however, that this method was so crude that the deception was easily discovered, and the men were forthwith arrested.


