The principal points dealt with in the paper were the organization of the C. P. R. engineering department, the resurvey of existing yards and tracks, the instrumental work and best form of notes to be used, the laying out of new yards, including crossovers and frogs; super-elevation and spirals. A short discussion followed, in which Messrs. G. B. Whitehead, A. K. Grimmer, K. A. Dunphy, G. F. Baird and others took part. A hearty and unanimous vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. McMullin and everyone left the rooms expressing their great satisfaction at the lecture.

**CHOOSING JUDGES FOR THE DEBATE**

Mount Allison and J. N. B. Having Trouble to Agree on Judges For Debate Here Next Week.

The date set for the U. N. B.-Mt. A. intercollegiate debate in this city is March the 25th, and lively interest is being taken in the matter by the supporters of both teams. The subject for debate this year is, Resolved, that Free Trade in coal and lumber between Canada and the United States would be beneficial to Canada, and U. N. B. will defend the negative. The University team is composed of Frank L. Orchard, '09; P. G. Burdick, '10, and W. G. Firth, '09; the Mt. A. men are Ritsie, Estbury and Rand. Lieutenant Governor Tweedie has agreed to act as chairman of the debate, and the judges will be Mr. Justice White and Mr. Justice McLeod, of St. John. The third judge is yet to be chosen, and some little difficulty is being experienced along this line. Mt. A. wants Dr. Alward, of St. John, while the U. N. B. has offered to accept either Judge Carleton or President Tufts, of Acadia.

**THE NEW STORE.**

The fixtures, which are the most up-to-date in the city, are the product of the Toronto Brass Manufacturing Co., and the furnishing of the store, which it fitted with modern plumbing and steel ceiling throughout, cost in the vicinity of \$900, exclusive of the stock. Through the new store the celebrated Bluet Brand of shirts and collars will be for the first time brought to this city, and Mr. Farrell has already engaged a thorough experienced manager from Toronto to take charge of this establishment.

**WOULD DEVELOP PORT OF L'ETANG**

Building of Railway From Vancero and Construction of Docks, Etc., Part of the Extensive Plans.

The Port Canada Docks, Warehouse and Storage Co., Ltd., is applying for incorporation by letters patent from the Provincial government, and notice of their application appears in the Royal Gazette this week.

The object of this company is the development of L'Etang, the Charlotte county port. Those applying for incorporation are Geo. W. Marsh and Walker L. E. Marsh, steamship merchants, of Toronto; Robert N. Agnew, financial broker, New York; Charles H. Clarke, merchant, of New York; and Joseph Doust, merchant, of Toronto.

These gentlemen are also largely interested in the Canada Terminal Railway Co., which has a charter to build a railway from Vancero to L'Etang, and it was stated this morning by one familiar with the affairs of those interested that that railway would have been built and development work well under way had it not been for the recent financial depression in New York and other centres. It is now proposed to prosecute this work at once and the completion of the railway and the development of the port will soon be started.

The Port Canada Docks, Warehouse and Storage Co. have a capital of \$99,000, and the gentlemen named above are provisional directors. They will have their chief place of business at L'Etang, and ask for the right to carry on an extensive business in docks, warehouses, cold storage, towing, wrecking, dredging, etc., as well as to make contracts with the British government for the use of their docks in time of war.

Hon. George J. Clarke, Speaker of the Assembly, is solicitor for the company in this province.
