Fourth s. of the late William Hodgins, Esq., of Dublin, formerly of the Co. Wicklow, Irel., by Fanny, dau. of the late James Doyle, Esq., of Newcastle, Co. Wicklow. B. in Dublin. Ed. there and at Bristol, Eng., and at University College, Toronto. Entered the University of Toronto 1853, where he gained the University Scholarship in Civil Polity and History, and also obtained first class honors with his degree of B.A., in 1856, and afterwards proceeded to the degrees of LLB. in 1858, and M.A. in 1860. M. 22 Nov. 1858, Ma: ia Burgoyne, dau. of the late John Scoble, Esq., who represented West Eigin in the Can Parlt from 1863 until Confederation. Called to the Bar, U C., Hilary Term, 1858. Created Q.C., Feb. 1873. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, as successor to Mr. (now Justice) Patterson, Trinity Term, 1874, and apptd.
