

River was already included in Reserve No. 3 and the other feature of this application was the Industrial School site, a strictly departmental matter. The application for Giayak was for land already covered by Timber Limit with the exception of two small reserves belonging to the Tanookteuch Band. As for the application for Zunt-dah-ya, on Gracraft Island, this was a rocky place which could never be of any use to anyone, for which reason he declined to endorse the application. On Aglakumna, or Tlawatsis Island, he recommended that 60 or 70 acres be granted if available, as he thought it was, also the small island on the west containing the old Indian Village site. The land covered by the application for Waskita, on Hardy Bay, was shown on the blue print to be all Crown Granted, and for this reason the application was now endorsed. As to the land asked for at Waki-da-tai, on the Eastern side of Lagoon Cove, Gracraft Island, some of it was apparently open, although Lot 53 was evidently an old surveyed Crown Grant, judging from the number given it. A channel ran through it that was navigable for canoes at high water, and it also contained a good clam beach. This was seemingly alienated, for which reason the application could not be recommended. The next application was for I-gie-da-lis, on Baronet Passage. All the peninsula there was apparently under Pulp Lease No. 500, but the Indians had had an old village there twenty one years ago and used the place every year during the fishing season. He recommended that ten acres be granted, taking in the Indian houses, and described as on the north shore of Baronet Passage close to Blackney Pass -- on the peninsula between Parson's Bay and Blackney Pass. These Indian houses had been in continuous use for many years. The location recommended was almost at the eastern end of the peninsula, and the place would be used as a halibut
