JARMAN ON WILLS was first published in 1841-44, and at once took a place, which it still holds, as the leading English treatise upon the subject. It was reprinted by LITTLE, BROWN & Co. in 1845, with American Notes by Hon. J. C. PERKINS. The sale in England has been such as to exhaust three editions, and a fourth is now in course of publication. In America the demand has been even greater. Before his death JUDGE PERKINS edited successively four editions of Jarman, and we now announce the FIFTH AMERICAN EDITION, with notes by MELVILLE M. BIGELOW. THE REPUTATION OF THE EDITOR. MR. BIGELOW'S treatises on Estoppel, Fraud, Torts, Equity, and Overruled Cases, are known to all lawyers who use books. His characteristics, as an editor, are stated by JUDGE COOLEY to be "sound judgment and unusual industry;" by Hon. EMOY WASHBURN, to be "great and accurate labor and discrimination;" by JUDGE MILLER, to be "research, exhaustive and faithful." In such hands, readers can be sure that the editorial notes will be both thorough and accurate, and will carry as much weight with the courts as the original text. The notes of the previous editor, JUDGE PERKINS, have been used wherever they are still applicable, but have been in most instances revised and recast by the present editor.
