## APPEARED AT LAST.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Nov. 14.—The November shower of Leonids is on, and will continue for the remainder of this week. If the sky is clear they will be visible from midnight on until near dawn in the direction of the constellation Leo in the northeast. Beginning with a few Leonids last night the rush of tiny stars will increase until Saturday and then gradually thin down and pass off on their long orbit.

Prof. Asaph Hall of the Michigan university observatory will watch them each night. Last night a few appeared. Clouds threaten to hide to-night's display.

Prof. Hall says the Leonids are supposed to be the remains of some vast planet that flew into atoms long ages ago and since have been flying about the track in which the planet used to travel.

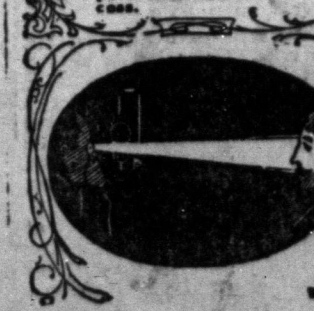
