Cottons, malt, meats, ale and beer, fancy goods, stained window glass, hats, caps, and bonnets, locomotive engines and railroad-cars, manufactures of caoutchouc and India rubber, manufactures of fur, machinery, rectified oils, printed books, and iron.

The statement appended giving a comparative view of the Dominion as represented by the value of its Imports and Exports, shows an increase in the Exports of upwards of \$2,906,833, the exact figures being for:—

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This increase is found in the Export of articles under the following general heads :

The Exports of the produce of the fisheries and of agricultural products, show a small decrease. The whole trade in Imports and Exports presents an aggregate amount of \$127,876,951. In this computation taken the value of the goods entered for consumption.

Thus computation taken the value of the goods entered for consumption, and not the value as shown by the column of general imports, which there is reason to believe gives an exaggerated figure, owing to the fact that importations removed from a first port of entry to be warehoused at another, have in some instances been erroneously treated as importations at the latter port, after having been entered as such at the former.
