

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Territorics, excepting 8 and 56, which has not been homestenical, or reserved to provide word-tost for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homestenated upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of onequarter sec-tion of 19 acces, more or less.

ENTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken in situate, or if the homestealer desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local Agent for authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homesteal entry

HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendments thereto to perform the conditions connected herewith, under one of the following plane:-

At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) or any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry upon the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a home-stead, the requirements of this Act as to ro-sidence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler has obtained a patent for his homestead, or a certificate for the issue of such patent countersigned in themanner pre-scribed by this Act, and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be statisfied by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his household, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

The term "vicinity" used above is mean o indicate the same township or an adjoining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provision³ of Clauses (2) (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acrew of his homestead, or whether the 20 head of stock, with buildings for their accommediation, and have basiles burres substituty forneed. Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homesteader law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT

Should be made at the end of the three years before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Hefore making applica-tion for patent the settler must give six months notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to notice Domini do so.

INFORMATION

Newly arrived immigrants will receive at the Immigration Office in Winnipeg, or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-west Territories information as to the ands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense, advice buil information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon ap-lication to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior. Unawa, Manitoba, or to any of the Dominion Lands Agents in Manitoba or the North-west Territories.
