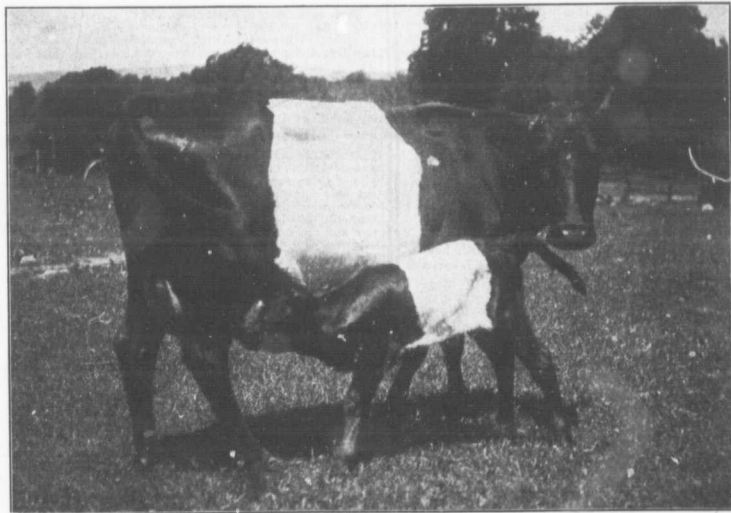

A BREED OF CATTLE WITH A SINGULAR CHARACTERISTIC ATTRACTIVENESS
Those cattle recognized as the purely dairy breeds,—the Ayrshi res, French Canadians, Guernseys, Jerseys and Holsteins—will always hold first place in the estimation of dairymen in America. But in addition to these well known breeds there is on this continent a small representation of several other breeds possessing dairy qualities. In this class are the Dutch Belted cattle. At the only public test where cows of this breed have competed with other breeds,—the Pan-American Model Dairy test,—they ranked eighth as milk producers, and tenth in butter production. The chief attraction of these cattle is their unusual marking the white blanket around the body always breeding true. Because of their singular markings they are popular with wealthy men who take to farming. The cow here shown—Happy Thought, 1640,—is owned by Mr. G. C. Gibbs, Markboro, N. J.
