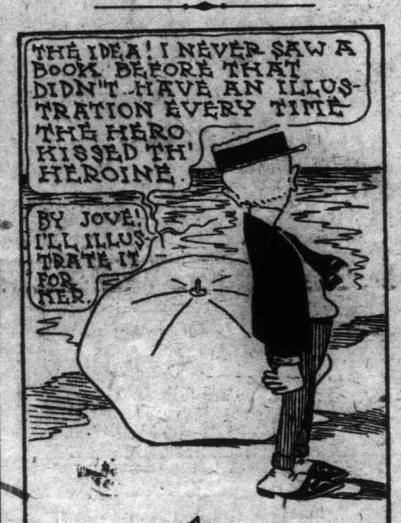
Burnt Out

BRANTFORD MAN RAN THE GAUNTLET OF GERMAN CRUISERS

Mr. W. J. Aikens arrived in the
city on Saturday afternoon, after a trip to the Old Land. He was on the Canadian Northern liner "The King Edward," and relates an exciting experience. Several hundred miles from Cape Race, a wireless was received with the warning that two German cruisers were in the vicinity. The captain kept the message to himself, but the passengers soon realized that there was danger by the preparations immediately made. There was dense fog at the time, the vessel only having made 74 miles in the previous 24 hours.

The order was given, "full steam
ahead," and the fog horn stopped from sounding. For four or five hours in the almost impenetrable haze, the ship was urged to her utmost capacity, and the anxiety under the circumstances was naturally very great. All bulkheads and watertight compartments were closed and lights put out. For four days and nights the captain remained on the bridge, and he was a manifestly much relieved man when he got his vessel, with its heavy human freight, safely into port.

FLASHES OVER WIRE

TO RELIEVE GERMANS
ROME, Aug. 10.—Via Paris 5.30 a.m.—An Austrian fleet of thirteen battleships and sixteen torpedo boats is said to be going at full steam towards the Strait of Otranto, which connects the Adriatic with the Ionian Sea. The probable purpose of the fleet is to give succor to the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau, which have been reported in that vicinity.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 10.—No big en-
gagement between the allied armies and the German troops is expected to occur on Belgian soil until the French and Belgian combined forces take the offensive.

It is asserted that a few hundred
German soldiers, occupying a farm at Solron near Pepinster in the province of Liege had been fired on by three workmen, and the village was given over to pillage by the German troops and the three workmen were taken out in a shot by a firing squad.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 10, 6.15 a.m., via
London, 11.20 a.m.—Reports reached here from many directions to-day of the retreat of the German cavalry before large French forces who are said already to have inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. The locality of the fighting is not revealed by the military circles. In military circles here BRUSSELS, Aug. 10, via London, was asserted to-day that there has been no further battle in the vicinity of Liege or in the town itself.

WAVED PISTOL, GERMAN OFFICER WAS OBDDURATE

Grand Duchess Tried to Bar Way of
Troops Into Luxemburg

LONDON, Aug. 10.—2.25 a.m.—During the fierce fighting of the last few days, says a despatch to The Daily Telegraph from Brussels, a large number of officers as compared with privates was disabled owing to their distinctive uniforms. A great Belgian Government has decided against the explosion of the Germans, although the country is infested with spies and German agents, who make desperate efforts to reveal and frustrate the plans of the military authorities.

A German major was the first to
cross the bridge (entering Luxemburg.) He found his way barred by a cabinet minister who turned his automobile across the bridge, and taking a copy of the Berlin treaty from his pocket, showed it to the major, who remarked: "I am acquainted with it, but have orders which I must execute." Immediately afterward, Marie Adelaide, Grand Duchess of Luxemburg, drove up in a motor car, which the chauffeur turned lengthwise across the bridge while the duchess exclaimed: "The neutrality of Luxemburg must be respected. I shall telegraph Emperor William."

The German officer answered: "You
had better go home quietly." When the commander of the Luxemburg remonstrated, the German officer, pointing a revolver toward the commander, retorted: "If these are not your methods, they are ours. Clear out!" Soon the work of military destruction began. Villages and farm houses were demolished, says the correspondent, and thickets cut down for strategic purposes. From Luxemburg to Rodange the fields are devastated and houses are in ashes. Trenches have been dug. Whoever casts a glance at these, is arrested as a spy. Germany secretly moved 900,000 men to the Belgian and Russian frontiers during the week ending August 2, with the object of surprising and overpowering the resisting forces at the outset of the war. Men were despatched without adequate provisions and ammunition.
