

## BRITISH BATTLESHIP SUNK BY MYSTERIOUS EXPLOSION.



Another British war ship and the lives of hundreds of men were lost when the battleship Bulwark was blown up while lying in the Thames off Sheerness, and only thirty-five miles from London. Only twelve of her crew were saved and the loss of life will amount to between 750 and 800 men. It is officially announced that the vessel was destroyed by an explosion originating within her own magazines, but it is generally believed that it was the work of a German submarine. The Bulwark was of 15,000 tons displacement. She was laid down in 1899 and completed in 1902. She was 411 feet lang, had a beam of 75 feet and drew 29 feet of water. Her armament consisted of four 12-inch and twelve 6-inch guns, sixteen 12-pounders, six 3-pounders and four submerged torpedo boats.

# WAR LOANS RUN AWAY

Britain Leads, With One of One Billion and Three-

The over-subscription to the British war loan makes it interesting to recall that the war loans already made or now in contemplation total \$4,333,625,000, which is the amount authorized since war broke out in Europe, a little over three months ago. Great Britain leads the list with its \$1,750,000,000 3 1-2 per cent. issue—the largeest single loan ever made in the history of the world. The recent issue of treasury bills, amounting to \$450,000,000 in all, are to be refunded from the proceeds of the new issue, so are not to be included in stating the extent of its war issues.
