QUEBEC MEN

Make Daylight Raid; Prisoners Taken

London, Feb. 8 .- The following ommunication was issued yesterday y the Canadian War Records office: "Revelling in the opportunities resented by the wintry conditions, Canadian troops have carried out wo more successful raids. Carefully planned and brilliantly executed both operations were completed vithout a hitch, and as a result rewo machine guns.
"One raid was made at night by a

composite party from Manitoba and Alberta, and the other in daylight by nen from Quebec. The principal pur pose in each instance was to harry the enemy, destroy his mine shafts, and secure prisoners. Both parties thoroughly fulfilled their mission. "In addition, German dugouts and machine-gun emplacements were destroyed by explosives and the enemy believed to have suffered casualties four times greater than those of the Canadians, which were very light in proportion to the complete success of the enterprise.

"The Canadians have now to their credit a total of seven successful raids in the past nine days."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS WEST LAND REGULATIONS
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not-Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre

Dutles—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead tent on certain conditions.
