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NEWS OF THE DAY.

CANADIAN.

There is an outbreak of typhoid fever at Hull, Que. Sir John Macdonald is visiting Halifax for the first time in ten years.

There is a good deal of diphtheria and typhoid fever prevailing at present. The Provincial Fair will be held in Kingston on September 11 by Sir John Macdonald.

The Ontario Government have offered \$100,000 for the best collection of grain, seeds, and roots for exhibition at the Eastern Fair.

Major Cameron has reached Kingston to assume command of the Royal Military College. He says in his new position that he will be glad to give his whole attention to military matters.

Hamilton is excited over the eloquence of Mr. Macpherson, of New York, who has been invited to give the address of honor at the annual meeting of the Society for the Abolition of Slavery.

The United States House of Representatives has passed the bill for the relief of the Cuban rebels, which provides for the withdrawal of American troops from the island.

The news from Jacksonville, Fla., is very encouraging. There are no new cases, and no deaths were reported for over forty hours. The epidemic has been almost entirely exterminated.

Secretary Bayard says the rejection of the Fabrice treaty in the Senate will not terminate the building of the ships of war, but that it will be a blow to the right of Canada to withdraw its forces within a radius of three miles of Perth, Mass.

Empress William will visit King Humbert in Rome in October. Russia is expected to support Turkey's view of the Masowian question.

A famine prevails in Epirus, Albania, and serious disorders have occurred. President Schuchman has arrived at Santiago de Cuba on an English steamer.

Thirty convicts on the way to Siberia attempted to escape, and eleven of them were killed. The business portion of Cayenne, French Guiana, has been burned, involving a loss of \$2,000,000.

The Haytian revolution has been successful and the President has taken refuge on an English frigate. The Prince of Wales is expected to visit the Emperor of Austria.

More suits are to be taken by Irish members against the "Times," their proclamation being to mulct the paper in costs. Finance Minister, twelve years of age, accompanied Mont Blain to the International Fair which will be held in Bradford.

The Porte has addressed a note to the powers declaring that the occupation of Masowia is a violation of existing treaties. The expected meeting of Signor Crispien and Prince Bismarck, it is believed, will strengthen the alliance between Italy and Germany.

Under the direction of the Porte, the Egyptian Government has protected against the establishment of an Italian protectorate over Zulu. A Naamk dispatch says the reports concerning the Wipac Indians are untrue.
